

NEW LINE FOR UNION PACIFIC

Right-of-Way Being Bought from Central City to Stromsburg.

WABASH RATE BENEFIT TO NEBRASKA

Reduction Which Has Been in Effect Two Weeks May Stir Up Conditions Beneficial to This State.

General Manager Mohler announces that the Union Pacific is buying the right-of-way for a railroad which will be built from Central City to Stromsburg. This will give the people of the South Platte country an outlet over the Union Pacific to the west. As it now is, any freight of passengers on that line for the west have to back up to Valley before going on the long journey.

This announcement is right in line with the avowed purpose of Mr. Mohler and Mr. Harriman to construct feeders for the magnificent transcontinental line which the Union Pacific now has between Omaha and the Pacific coast.

Latest Cut at Wabash. The last announcement of the Wabash on export corn rates is apt to stir up matters to the advantage of the Nebraska corn growers. This is the rate which the Wabash has had in effect for two weeks, but now it has again announced one which makes the rate a good one. He says his road will take care of the loading charges on vessels and will make the rate apply through Chicago and St. Louis instead of Hannibal and will give transit privileges. The statement that for several months the rate has been 27 cents is wrong because it is a matter of common knowledge the Milwaukee has been hauling corn to Baltimore from Omaha for 18 cents, with established differentials to other ports.

Shippers of grain are greatly pleased over the result of this differential was cut, 23 cents in putting in operation a rate of 23 cents on corn for export from Omaha to New York. The western lines had been unable to come to any agreement with the lines east of Chicago, and D. O. Ives, freight traffic director of the Wabash, stepped in to help. He put in the through rate which would get the business away from the gulf ports. It is understood the Wabash is not interfering with any grain for Baltimore and does not recognize the established differentials to that port.

Action a Year Ago. About a year ago the roads agreed upon a rate which would carry grain to the Atlantic seaboard and take some of it away from the gulf routes, which were getting all the grain and threatening to destroy the grain business of the eastern ports. The differential in favor of the gulf ports was 6 cents. By an agreement about three months ago this differential was cut, to 3 cents. The lines east demanded a larger division of the rate than had been agreed upon and a disruption occurred. The Northwestern, when it saw it could not get grain to the coast, made a rate of 18 cents to the gulf via New York, and put in there a new route. The Milwaukee then stepped in and made a rate of 18 cents from Omaha and 15 cents from Kansas City to Baltimore. The Wabash also put in a rate of 18 cents to New York from Omaha, but this was not a 2-cent recent agreement providing for a 2-cent rate was announced. Here is where the roads failed to agree and all withdrew the rate, except the Wabash, which still has that tariff filed with the Interstate Commerce commission.

Mr. Ives came to the rescue of the grain men of Omaha as well as the grain interests on the Atlantic seaboard, and, having a line of his own, or rather Mr. Gould's, whom he represents, from Omaha to Buffalo, he was able to ignore the central freight lines and the Wabash is the only road now hauling any grain from Nebraska to the Atlantic seaboard. The remainder of all going to the gulf, Chicago was wrought up over the situation, because Mr. Ives had ignored Chicago and routed his grain through Hannibal, Mo. Chicago would cease to be a factor in connection with the transmissouri export trade, and both Chicago and St. Louis feared they had no rights which must be respected.

Packing Products in the Air. Railroad rates on export packing house products again are confusing and some exceptionally low rates have been made on these goods from Omaha. Some time ago the Alton put in a low rate from Kansas City to the coast and the Wabash protected Omaha by putting in the same rate from Omaha, which was 10 cents to the Mississippi river and 35 cents beyond. Now nearly all of the roads are taking a slice at the rates on this export packing house stuff. Contracts recently have been made of products destined for export to Chicago and 20 cents beyond, making a total of 20 cents or a cut of 15 cents per hundred.

The Wabash is stirring up matters considerably in the grain situation as well as the packing house products for export. The local rate to Chicago has also been cut from 25 cents to 15 cents.

This cut to the east also has shattered rates to the gulf and contracts are known to have been made to New Orleans for 21 cents on packing house products destined for export.

City Tracks Are Laid. The Union Pacific has laid all track laying for which permission was recently given by the city council. This gives the road a splendid system of tracks for jobbers and puts tracks in front of a large number of lots in the eastern portion of the city which were heretofore unavailable for large jobbing houses. The tracks now run up Ninth street on both sides, turn the corner at Capitol avenue and then run north on Twelfth. An injunction stopped proceedings for a time at the corner of Ninth and Capitol avenue, but the opposition finally subsided and the tracks are now in place.

Several important sales of property for public purposes have been made since Mr. Mohler decided to put in these tracks and many new blocks will be built in the spring. The location being decided upon after the decision of the Union Pacific to transform this proscribed district from a lot of shacks to a jobbing center.

REPORT OF GAS INSPECTOR

Annual Statement of Lynch is Not Fault-Finding, to Say the Least. According to the annual report of Gas Inspector John C. Lynch, just filed, he only found ninety-one lamps not burning during the year. He shows 1,197 gas lamps are in use on the streets and 259 gasoline lamps, yet he found 274 of the latter extinguished while making his nightly rounds in 1905.

The inspector recommends that apparatus be bought and installed to analyze gas so that its ingredients can be ascertained; also the acquisition of a Bristol gauge to test the pressure. The inspector reports the gas testing apparatus was repaired and made ready for use September 12. Since then he tested forty-two meters brought to his office, finding but six of them "fast" and the remainder correct or "slow."

To the contrary, the inspector says the general service of the gas company has been good. Requests for 32 lamps of some kind are on file in the inspector's office and he suggests the city contract for 20 more gas lights to be distributed in outlying districts. He recommends all gas and gas-line pipes be located one foot inside the curb lines to assist in making the city beautiful and getting the best results. Some posts are now in the center of walks and are dangerous and unsightly. Unused poles should be removed and stored in the city tool house, according to the inspector.

Inspector Lynch says he carefully inspected the gas works of the company and found them to be in first-class condition. The gas, he says, is termed water gas, made from coke and "riched" with naphtha or crude oil. During the year the gas company relocated forty-five gas lamps, charging \$225 for the service. The Weisbach Lighting company relocated thirty-seven lamp posts and made no charge.
