SONGS OF THE PEOPLE SUNG

Miss Mackin Directs a Very Successful and Popular Folk Song Concert.

A program of national folk songs, under the direction of Miss Helen Mackin and the auspices of the Omaha High School Choral society, was given last night before several hundred people in the rooms of the Board of Education in the city hall. The same program was given a short time ago in the musical department of the Woman's club and scored such a decided success that Miss Mackin was induced to have it repeated.

Miss Mackin prefaced the program with a talk on Indian songs and on folk songs in general, explaining the meaning of those which were about to be sung. Indian songs, she said, are the distinctly American folk songs, though the negro songs of the south are also peculiar to this country.

Each one taking part in the program was warmly applauded and all responded with encores. Several of these songs had been heard by the singers in lands where they are on the tongue of every peasant. One of the most striking was "Aurora Aina," sung by Mrs. Wagner Thomas, who yodeled after the manner of the peasants she had heard in the Alps.

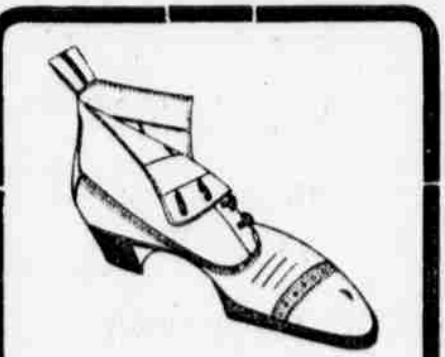
