MILLION DOLLARS IN YEAR

Amount Ordered to Be Spent by Nebraska Telephone Company.

VOICE OF DIRECTORS AT ANNUAL MEETING

Two Thousand Miles More of Toll Lines, Multiplying Number of Exchanges, Will Be Built.

At the annual meeting of the directors of the Nebraska Telephone company the directors voted to authorize the officers of the company to expend \$1,000,000 throughout the state during the current year in improvements and necessary changes. In addition to that important business the annual election of officers was held with the following elected:

President: H. E. Yost, president; H. Vance Lane, vice president and general manager; E. C. O. Morgan, secretary and treasurer; W. C. P. Fiske, auditor; Lawrence Brinker, assistant treasurer; directors, G. W. Holmberg, H. W. Yates, Guy C. Barton, C. W. Lyman, W. W. Morgan, F. E. Plush at Boston, E. M. Morgan, H. V. Lane and C. E. Yost. The only change in the directory and official roster was electing Mr. Lane vice-president and one of the directors.

Mr. Lane will assume the duties of vice president in addition to those of general manager. Mr. Lyman was vice president last year.

President Yost said the \$1,000,000 appropriated for improvements will be expended in constructing about 2,000 miles of additional toll lines, placing central energy switchboards at stations where they are not now in use, changing some exchanges to cable plants in place of the open wire system and making other improvements throughout the territory of the company. As the company has been making extensive improvements here during the last year it was stated that a large portion of the appropriation will go out into the state, although the Omaha end will get its share, Mr. Yost explained.

SLOAN DEMANDS NEW TRIAL

Former United States Commissioner Becomes Tired of Delays by the Government.

Thomas L. Sloan, who is under indictment found in November, 1904, on the charge of submitting a false claim while United States commissioner, appeared before Judge Klunger in the United States district court Friday morning with his attorney, H. C. Bromberg, and asked for an immediate trial. The case has been set for trial several times, but was delayed on account of the absence of material witnesses for the government. The principal witness in the case for the government is Inspector Finch, whose inspection of Sloan's books as commissioner brought about the indictment.

Judge Munger stated to Mr. Bromberg and Mr. Sloan that he would call the case for trial at the present term and instructed the attorneys for the government to have their witnesses on hand between now and the last of March in any event.

NOR. 649-647—SOME BOUDOIR FINERY. Any fresh suggestion in boudoir finery is always welcome to the progressive home sewer, and the accompanying sketch may prove of value to you. The dressing sack is one which may be made of fine French flannel, silk, or dotted Swiss. If made of a firm material the edges should be scalloped or buttonholed, with a color to match the figure, if any, of the goods. The design is unique in that the sleeves and yoke are in one piece and the remaining portion without seam. There is no work in the making, yet a deal of grace and ease in the garment. Ribbons fasten the front. The petticoat has the removable flounce so much liked by many. This may prove very economical if the upper portion is made of some fine black material and the attachable flounce of silk to match the various gowns. This would do away with the necessity of having a number of petticoats. The joining is effected beneath the deep tuck, so that it is entirely concealed. In the medium size the sack demands three yards of 36-inch material, while the skirt calls for eight yards.




