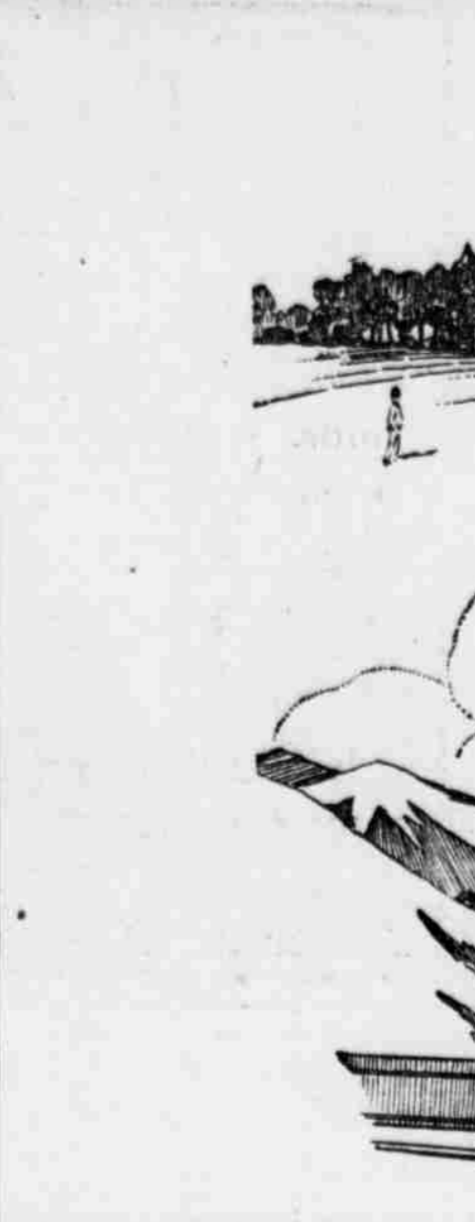
Mrs. Edwin Lambert was called to Keokuk, Ia., by the serious illness of her mother during the week.
