Dealing in Futures on Change First Time in Eighteen Months.

CAUSED BY CHICAGO RAISING THE FEE

Result Will Be Increased Business for Omahn Board, as Dealers Will Go on Floor Here.

OMAHA, Feb. 16, 1906. There was dealing in futures on the floor f the Omaha Grain Exchange today for he first time in more than a year and a alf. This was brought about by the action

the first time in more than a year and a half. This was brought about by the action of the Chicago exchange in voting a new rule raising the commission price from 1/4 to 1/4 of a cent per bushel. The proposition carried by a majority of 1/8 votes and the rule will be effective March 1. The effect upon the Omaha commission men was the announcement that hereafter there will be all the business possible on the Omaha exchange. They have been handling pretty nearly everything in options through Chicago and splitting the commission with the brokers there. Both the local brokers and their customers decline to stand for the advance in commission charges and their customers decline to stand for the floor in the Board of Trade building and the chalking up of option prices on the Omaha section of the board for the first time in many moons.

Bids were made in some profusion for wheat, corn and oats, but there was actual trading only in corn. Von Dorn buying 10,000 bushels of May and July, "mostly to push the thing along," he said. Nevertheless the local dealers showed great interest in the new situation created and spoke enthusiastically of the prospects for a lively market in futures right here at home. They do not look for a great deal of activity until March I, when the new rule goes into effect in Chicago. Then, some of them say, they expect there will be business coming this wey instead of the reverse, which has been the rule. The season given for the action in Chicago is the belief of the brokeers that the country is good and prosperous and will stand for the higher charges. ers that the country is good and prosperous and will stand for the higher charges. The decline of a cent in wheat was chaked up to the lower Liverpool cables, which, in turn, were caused by the heavy shipments last week of 3.80,000 busheis from Argentina, whereas but 2,40,000 busheis were estimated; also on account of the favorable weather in the domestic winter wheat belt. The Modern Miller was authority for the statement that the winter wheat crop is in very fair shape and the outlook on the Pacific coast excellent.

Corn continued its downward tendency owing to a lack of export demands. The market was very dull and had no features whatever. Dealers were rather anxious not to have offerings made, fearing a still further decrease, according to reports.
