

MOORES GOES TO BROATCH

Mayor Takes Up Publicly with His Most Implacable Personal Enemy.

ISSUES WRITTEN STATEMENT TO FRIENDS

Move Had Been Foreshadowed and Causes Little Disturbance in City.

The foreshadowed conversion of Mayor Moore to the support of W. J. Broatch's mayoralty ambition was confirmed by a statement Saturday defining his position. The mayor says his chief reason for assuming the attitude is because he believes Broatch to be the stronger of the two republican aspirants opposed to E. A. Benson.

At the city hall it is thought the appointments and employes of the present administration will be divided between allegiance to Broatch and Broatch. Two of the most active Broatch men are Gas Inspector Lynch and Plumbing Inspector Kugel.

Civil Service Changes.

The United States Civil Service commission announces these examinations to secure eligibles to fill existing vacancies.

February 21—For the position of plant pathologist and entomologist, at \$1,200 per annum, in the office of experimental stations of the Department of Agriculture, for service in the Philippines, Hawaii, Alaska, and where. Age limit, 30 years or over. It will not be necessary for applicants to appear at any place for examination. They may submit copies of articles or publications prepared by them along the line of plant pathology and entomology. The material will be returned after the examination.

February 23—For the position of assistant examiner in the patent office at \$720 per annum, in the Bureau of Patents, Department of Commerce, Washington, at \$720 per annum. Age limit, 30 years or over.

March 7—For the position of seaman (class B) in the State, War and Navy departments building, Washington, at \$720 per annum. Age limit, 30 years or over.

March 14—For the position of marine furrier, at \$600 per annum. Age limit, 30 years or over.

Peccol Highway Robbery Story Comes to Attention of the Police.

VICTIM CONCEALS FACT THREE DAYS

Police Then Arrest the Robbers and Discover They Had Returned the Stolen Money to Their Victim.

A peculiar case of robbery was committed in South Omaha last Wednesday. Patrick Logan, locally known as 'Paddy,' was held up by four men and robbed of \$10.50, but he made no complaint to the police and did not tell any of his friends until yesterday. When they learned of it they advised him to see the police. This he did and he was the first knowledge the department had of the crime. Logan is a young fellow who had been held up by four men, most of whom appeared to be young fellows. This occurred in Albricht. From the description the police were able to locate John Karnes, Jr., who lives at 249 Polk street. Karnes did not hesitate to confess the crime, but said the money was paid him through an intermediary. It is apparent that he did not know how to proceed or he would have notified the police at once. If he cannot be induced to file a complaint and the police do not arrest him, then the only way to bring the boys to trial will be for the chief of police to file the complaint with the county judge.
