

J. J. BUCKLEY FOUND GUILTY

Man Accused of Robbery Convicted Despite Leo Angus' Confession.

VICTIM CONTRADICTS THE YOUNGESTER

Identifies the Other Fellow and Jury Proceeds to Put Angus in Same Category with Pat Crowe.

In one respect at least Leo Angus and Pat Crowe occupy positions of striking similarity. Crowe confessed to a monstrous crime and a jury, intimating he was a preacher, acquitted him. Angus, one of the youths at the Lausten murder, confessed to a crime and the jury didn't as much as dignify him with recognition, promptly convicting the man accused of the crime which the youngester, for a reason not stated, took upon himself.

The defense in the case of James J. Buckley, charged with holding up the saloon of J. P. Healey at Albright, sprung a surprise Monday forenoon in district court when Leo Angus, one of the four young men charged with the murder of Saloonkeeper Lausten, took the witness stand and testified that he and not Buckley held up Healey's saloon. He said he did the job with a man named Smith, whose whereabouts he did not now know. He declared Buckley had nothing to do with the crime.

Drunk and Could Not Recall.

The state, on cross-examination, questioned the witness closely as to the details, but his usual response was that he was drunk when it happened and was unable to remember. He could not identify Healey as the man he held up. One point in his testimony was given special stress by the state. He said he met no one just before going into the saloon. G. W. Clark had previously testified he had met the men just as he was entering the saloon and they were going in. Angus said they stopped to tie the mask over his face, but he was sure no one passed them. He said he heard shots fired while they were running away, but they had fired none themselves.

The state placed several witnesses on the stand who identified Buckley as one of two men who were together in Schneider's saloon on the night of the robbery. Healey also identified him as one of the two hold-ups.

Chief Justice of District Court testified as to damaging admissions made by Buckley in regard to the affair. In rebuttal of Angus' confession, Mr. Healey, the victim of the holdup, went on the stand and testified Angus was not the man who did the work. He said the man who held the gun did not have a mask on. He was also examined at some length as to what took place for the purpose of showing Angus' description did not fit all of the conditions. Patrolman Collier testified he was the only officer in the vicinity of the saloon and he didn't see Angus on the night of the holdup. Angus had testified to seeing an officer on the way to the saloon.

Megreath Files Suit.

James G. Megreath has filed a suit in district court against the city of Omaha, claiming the park board prevented the taking of property belonging to him for park purposes. The land in question is situated on Third avenue and 134th street. The suit was appraised at \$2,500. The suit is an error proceeding in which the court is asked to pass on the legality of the action of the city council in awarding the ordinance concerning the land was passed less than a week after it was introduced, was not approved by the city council after its passage and that faulty service was had on the plaintiff of the notice of the meeting of the appraisers.

Grotte Moves the Building

Chief Clerk Grotte of the city building department did a little private police duty Saturday and had a lively session. Grotte happened to stroll down sixteenth street and observed a frame shanty had been dumped partly on the sidewalk and partly on the vacant lot at the southwest corner of Harney street. The shack was in active use by a Greek man with a corps of Greek boys, all prepared to shing. Grotte brought himself of the ordinance which forbids the erection of frame buildings within the frame limits and notified the Greek in charge that he would have to move his business block. The Greek, whose name is John Burbillous, exhibited deficiency in the use of English, but protested he did not own the structure. Grotte made a tour among the fruit and shoeing men but could learn nothing more as to the ownership. He then called in a policeman and the street cleaning department and the shack picked up, placed on a wagon and hauled to the city yard. Burbillous got a lawyer and admitted he was the owner, but protests were of no avail. License Inspector Sam Scott also had a part in the comedy which attracted a good deal of attention from bystanders and was prolonged several hours.
