GOSSIP OF THE POLITICIANS

Fontanelles Are a Bitter Split Up Lot of Warring Braves.

EFFORTS ARE TO REVIVE MEMBERSHIP ROLL

Where the Gamblers Count on Gaining a New Foothold by the Election of Broach to the Mayor's Chair.

Reports are coming in that the reputed Benson "house to house" campaign has at last got under way. It seems the missionaries are first importuning applications for membership in the Fontanelles club and basing their requests upon the Benson candidacy. With the Broach defection and other losses from private grievances the club has been in an exceedingly wobbly condition. The energy that characterized the former Benson campaign has not yet developed in the present fight. Even Fontanelles braves who retain a semblance of allegiance to the organization are going about with long faces deprecating the weight the club has to carry with such loads as John Westberg upon it. As one of them put it, "Westberg is in the boat but adds no oar to the motive power." Both Houghton and other founders of the club are seen together around the Broach headquarters and their old haunt on lower Farnam street know them no more.

A man who has occasion to watch local politics closely because of the nature of his business said: "I notice the Civic Federation people are asking how the gamblers behind Broach can hope to get a grip on Omaha with Broach as mayor, when they have been unable to do so for several years because public sentiment has been so overwhelmingly against it. The answer is easy. If the Broach crowd elects its candidate they will hold that in an extraordinary administration that the people have so voted. They will declare the issue was squarely whether the town should be open or closed to gambling and attendant vices, and will use this argument in every possible way.

The pretended business of the election itself, the big Denver gambler, in Omaha has some foundation in fact. He is trying to dispose of the store building at 1113 Douglas street, where the Diamond pool room was formerly operated. This structure was loaded on him several years ago for \$3,000. He is willing to sell it at a sacrifice. This does not indicate any desire to abandon Omaha as a gambling field in case his friend Broach is elected, but simply a wish to get out from under a bad real estate investment."

ZEEES AND KASPER EXCHANGE

Both Free on Arson Charge and Letter is Arrested Anew, with Zees State's Witness.

One of the most interesting and closely contested criminal cases to be tried and disposed of in the local police court was brought in on a sliding yesterday afternoon when Police Judge Crawford discharged John Zees and Morris Kasper, who were jointly charged with burning an insured building at 1601 Leavenworth street, occupied by Zees as a candy factory and store.

Kasper, who while nominally a co-defendant in the case, was the state's witness against Zees, who was tried practically on the sworn affidavit and testimony of Kasper. The case was given a new coloring when, at the close of the arson case, Kasper was re-arrested by Detectives Maloney and Drummy on the charge of uttering a forged instrument, which charge was preferred by John Zees through his attorney.

HENNINGS MAN FOR MAYOR

Douglas County Republican Club is Ready to Endorse His Candidacy.

The Douglas County Republican club met last night in the rooms of the Swedish Library association on North Fifteenth street, expecting to make endorsements of municipal candidates. This was not done, as the committee appointed to make recommendations was not ready to report. It is said no trouble was experienced in deciding upon Hennings as the man for mayor, but some difficulty has been experienced on councilman offices. Anticipating a largely attended meeting next Friday night, President Peterson suggested that larger and more central quarters be secured for the meeting. Library Board Meeting

The library board held its regular monthly session last night, with all members present except West and Perrine, who were absent. The report of the committee on salaries was adopted. 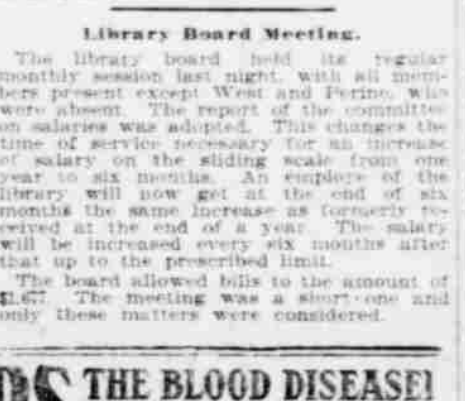
