SAGGING TENDENCY SOON SETS IN

Unsatisfactory Condition of Money Supply the Feature of the Day.

NEW YORK, March 3.—There was a flareup of prices in the opening dealings today touching to a point or upwards in many of the international stocks and specialities. Within ten minutee of the opening, however, a sagging tendency set in which continued with only temporary interruption up to the closing of the two-hour session, when prices were at the lowest and still declining, losses having been quite generally substituted for the earlier gains. The little spurt at the opening was caused by the decision of the secretary of the ireasury to deposit \$10,000,000 at the great banking centers to offset the effect of the heavy payments to the government on account of the 5 per cent redemption fund last week incident to the expiration of the currency redemption period of old bank charters which were renewed in large numbers three years ago. The last action of charters which were renewed in large numbers three years ago. The last action of the market was based to some extent on the conclusion that the amount officially thus promised for the money market would have little effect on interest rates. There was a suggestive advance in foreign exchange rates today, following the secretary's announcement, which raised the question as to how far a resort to foreign banking facilities might be precluded by the offering of the additional supply here.

The bank statement proved equally inadequate to check the sagging tendency of the market, although the contraction of loans and the consequent reduction of deposits and of the resegve requirement served to protect the surplus of the banks from any but a nominal inroad by the week's withdrawals of cash. These proved about what was expected and as some of the heaviest shipments to the interior were about what was expected and as some of the heavlest shipments to the interior were made on Thursday and Friday the effect on the daily average may be expected to be thrown over into next week's bank statement. The sub-treasury had, a credit balance at the clearing house today, indicating a continuance of the drain from the money market to the government. The comparatively favorable bank statement indicated that the consolidation of the surplus reserves was dependent on the loan contraction. With the tendency still running against the cash reserves of the banks and the proposets of a further withdrawal of credits to keep pace with the shrinkage in reserve speculative sentiment was disinclined to venture upon new commitments in the stock market. The later pressure on the market centered particularly on Amalgamated Copper, as was the case yesterday.
