

LIVELY SKIRMISH TO FILE

Unexpected Rush of Ambitious Ones to Go on Primary Ticket.

ELBOURN CLOSES OFFICE AT NOON

Charles Unitt and A. G. Edwards Withdraw as Committee Men to File for Defunct Offices at City Hall.

An unexpected rush was made on the city clerk's office at the last minute to make filings for places on the primary ballots. From 11:30 until after 12 o'clock the office was crowded with politicians. A few minutes after noon City Clerk Elbourn, finding the crowd was still coming, gave orders to lock the doors. This was done, and further entries were barred. The clerk kept his word that no filings would be accepted after 12 o'clock, because the city ordinances authorize the closing of the office at that hour on Saturdays. However, several filings were written out with the ink still wet in a few minutes past the hour.

The most interesting events were those concerning filings at the last moment for the positions of city treasurer and city tax commissioner by men from both the republican and democratic parties. The present charter does not recognize any such offices, but merges them with the county treasurer and county assessor, though a case is pending in the supreme court seeking to restore the offices and annul the consolidation. There has been no talk of anyone standing as a candidate for either office, and the democratic list least, had wholly overlooked the matter.

Unitt and Edwards Get Busy. The first intimation that some politicians had not forgotten all about the contingency of a supreme court decision restoring the two offices was manifested by Charles Unitt and A. G. Edwards at about the same time. Both withdrew from committee filings and submitted filings demanding places on the republican ballot for the office of city treasurer. They were followed quickly by a similar application signed by William A. Higgins.

The news of these transactions spread quickly among the city politicians in the clerk's office, and a few minutes later messengers were scurrying to democratic headquarters and other places with the tidings. With the treasurer's matter opened up the tax commissioner's office was suggested and in a short time Van B. Ledy filed for the office on the republican ballot.

Arter Rounds them Up. A. A. Arter, one of the Dahlgren campaign managers, had twenty minutes of the most strenuous exercise in his life trying to get democratic candidates for the two hypothetical jobs. Deputy City Comptroller Fred H. Cosgrove finally filed for treasurer. Tax Commissioner Fleming firmly declined to take a chance at making himself ridiculous. Arter was at his post, for the hour of noon had almost come. Finally he persuaded Lucius A. Crowell, an unfamished reporter lately arrived from Los Angeles, to permit the use of his name. Crowell signed an application blank and thus the ticket was made complete. The filing was allowed was that of Deputy City Treasurer I. L. Belsel for city treasurer, republican.

City Clerk Elbourn said: "Unless the supreme court rules to the contrary, in time, I shall recognize no such offices as city treasurer or city tax commissioner in making up the primary election proclamation or the ballots. As the law stands these offices do not exist, and under the prevailing circumstances it will require a court order to induce me to recognize the offices."

DIGGS HELD AND WOMAN GOES

Negro Will Be Tried for Murder of F. E. Wheeler, Whose Widow is Released as Witness.

James Diggs, colored, of 911 North Seventh street appeared in police court Saturday morning with his attorney, J. M. MacFarland, and was held for examination in the case of murder filed against him Thursday morning by Deputy County Attorney Foster. Diggs is held on the charge of murdering Frank E. Wheeler on South Fourteenth street the night of Friday, February 23. Diggs has been taken by the police to the county jail.

On the recommendation of Attorney Foster, Mrs. Wheeler was released from custody on practically her own recognition to appear at Diggs' trial as a state's witness against the colored man. Mrs. Wheeler signed her own bond of \$300 for her appearance.

It is believed the Diggs case will be called for hearing in the district court during the May term.

Before her release by the police authorities Saturday morning Mrs. Wheeler had a final conference with Captain Dunsen and Deputy County Attorney Foster regarding her knowledge of the murder. In line with her former statements the woman continued she had no knowledge of how her husband was killed or who killed him. After the conference Deputy County Attorney Foster testified that what she had said regarding the woman's connection with the case was exactly in line with Mrs. Wheeler's statements Saturday morning. Newspapers of any kind had been withheld from the woman during her incarceration of eight days.

The county commissioners Saturday morning authorized a reward of \$100 for information leading to the arrest of the man who committed the criminal assault upon Mrs. Alfred Hengren at Valley early Wednesday morning. The matter was brought to the attention of the board in the meeting of the committee of the whole by Deputy Sheriff Steere, who said the people of Valley would offer an additional \$100, making a reward sufficient to induce private detective agencies to take up the

MISS FOOS IS RE-ELECTED

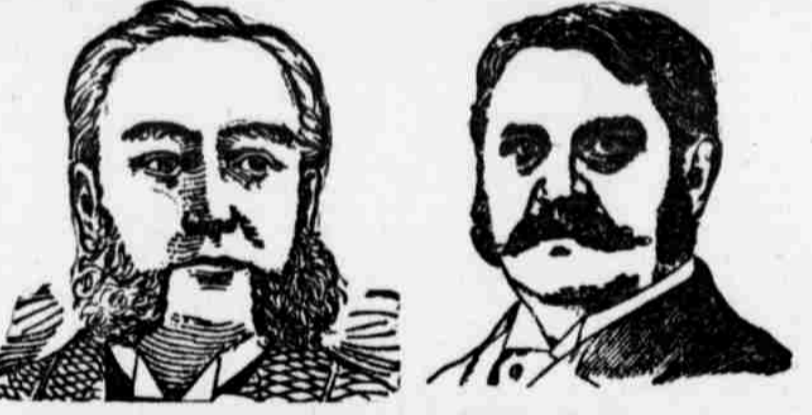
Despite Her Serious Illness She is Again President of Teachers' Association.
