The clerk kept his word that no filings would be accented after 12 o'clock, because the city ordinances authorize the closing of the office at that hour on Saturdays. The most interesting events were those concerning filings at the last moment for the positions of city treasurer and city tax mmissioner by men from both the republican and democratic parties. The present charter does not recognize any such offices, but merges them with the county treasurer and county assessor, though a case is pending in the supreme court seeking to restore the offices and annul the consolidation. There has been no talk of anyone standing as a candidate for either office, and the democrats, at least, had wholly overlooked the matter.

Uniff and Edwards Get Husy.

The first intimation that some politicians had not forgotten all about the contingency of a supreme court decision restoring the two offices was manifested by Charles Unitt and A. G. Edwards at about the same time. Both withdrew from committeeship filings and submitted filings demanding places on the republican ballot for the office of city treasurer. They were followed quickly by a similar application signed by William A. Higgins.

The news of these transactions spread quickly among the fifty politicians in the clerk's office, and a few minutes later messengers were scurrying to democratic headquarters and other places with the tidings. With the treasurership matter opened up the tax commissioner's office was suggested and in a short time Von B, Lady filed for the office on the republican ballot.





Negro Will He Tried for Murder of F. E. Wheeler, Whose Widow is Released as Witness.

James Diggs, colored, of 911 North Seventeenth street appeared in police court Saturday morning with his attorney, J. M. Macfarland, and waived the preliminary examination in the case of murder filed against him Thursday morning by Deputy County Attorney Foster. Diggs is held on the charge of murdering Frank E. husband was killed or who killed him. After the conference Deputy County Attorney Foster frankly admitted that what The Bee had said regarding the woman's connection with the case was exactly in line with Mrs. Wheeler's statements Saturday morning. calculated to wield a deterrent influence upon such depredations. Though Mr. Clarke survived the encounter, it is readily perceived that, so far as the footpad was concerned, the result might easily have been fatal. The fact, therefore, that a tragedy was averted has none the less modified the popular determination to capture and convict, if possible, this culprit and his accomplice, who fied before the shot was fired, and place a ban upon a repetition of such instances of outlawry.

Action Promptly Taken.

Promptly after the commission of the crime upon Mr. Clarke J. L. Brandels & Sons and A. L. Clarke of Hastings, father of the wounded man, offered a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the

culprit. This action was heartily commended by business men Saturday, and at its meeting yesterday afternoon the Commercial club took steps toward raising a fund of \$2,500 to be paid for the capture, within ten days, of Mr. Clarke's assailant, and another \$2,500 to be held by the Commercial club for similar purposes in case of another emergency. The club will raise half and asks the public to raise the

other half. "The Commercial club wishes to invite every citizen of Omaha who is anxious to rid his city of crime and criminals and punish the perpetrators of these dustardly outrages to co-operate with it in raising this money," said Secretary McVann yesterday.

Messrs, Brandeis and the senior Mr Clarke agreed to let their \$1,000 head the list to be raised by popular subscription and before the Commercial club adjourned its meeting another \$500 had been subscribed. It may be mentioned that this meeting was called abruptly and owing to the time it was possible to secure but

slight attendance, but the project is known to have met with cordial sympathy.

In addition to the money thus proposed to be raised Acting Chief of Police Mostyn said yesterday he would submit a request to the city authorities to co-operate in the

movement. Mr. Clarke's courageous resistance of the highwaymen has been generally commended and in the same degree has the crime been deplored.

Money for Chicken Thieves.

Fifty citizens of Monmouth park and Central park have made up a purse of \$100 which will be paid for the arrest and conviction of thieves who had stolen hundreds of chickens in the community during the winter. The last depredation was upon the henropst of Walter[®] Wharton and forty fowls were taken between dusk and dawn

The sufferers have organized in despera tion and besides a private patrol system have subscribed the reward money.

Beward for Fugitives.

No trace of the three men who escaped from the county jail Thursday night has been found. Sheriff McDonald has offered a reward of \$50 each for their arrest and is sending out 400 notices to the authorities all over the United States.

Another Culprit Wanted.

The county commissioners Saturday morning authorized a reward of \$100 for information leading to the arrest of the man who committed the criminal assault upon Mrs. Alfred Hengreen at Valley carly Wednesday morning. The matter was brought to the attention of the board in the meeting of the committee of the whole by Deputy Sheriff Sieere, who said the people of Valley would offer an additional \$100. making, a reward sufficient to inducprivate detective agencies to take up the
