Clean and Beautiful City.

I deem it an important part of the duty of the city to be clean and benutiful. I believe in parks and open spaces situated within easy access of those who need them. A park may be at once a necessity and a luxury, but it should be viewed first as a necessity and located with this idea in view. There are those in every large city whose feet paver troad God's green carpet except on public grounds. There are mothers and children who have no other resort for sunshine and wholesome air, and to these the park, to fill its mission, must be of easy access. We have no right to build a city in a manner that the poorest child has not a chance to be brought up amid surroundings that are clean and healthful and moral. I believe in hulding for the future and in the establishment of small parks and play grounds in what is destined to be the most crowded part of the city, and future generations should pay their just proportion of the cost of such improvements. The question of parks, open space and play grounds is not so much an aesthetic as an economic and moral question.

I believe in a fair deal and a square deal for every man, woman, child, corporation and interest. This much over one has a right to depend as a right to expect as a concession.
