INIFORM TEXT BOOKS OPPOSED

### Sentiment Not So Near Lunnimous as Had Been Supposed.

Reports from the rural school districts are to the effect that the opposition to the proposed uniformity of textbooks to be oted on at the school election on March 12 is growing apace. It is stated that while a remjorily of the school directors signed the petition for the presentation of the question at the coming election a large mumber of the school patrons and not a few of the school directors themselves are opposed to the proposition.

By those who are opposed to the proposi tion it is contended that 'in practically twenty out of the twenty-eight township school districts a uniformity of textbooks at present exists and the adoption of the proposition would mean nothing more or less than a complete change in the textbooks now used in these twenty or more school districts. It is also pointed out by the opponents to the proposition that the adoption of the proposition would undoubtedly lead to long and probably costly liligation, due to the fact that in most of the townships throughout the county the present contracts for textbooks have yet about four years to run. In this connection, it is contended that the adoption of the proposition, should it carry at the school election. would not have the effect of abrogating the existing contracts, although County Superintendent McManus in his circular has in-

sisted that none of these contracts are legal or binding. The correctness of Superintendent McManus' position in respect to the existing contracts is questioned by
