INTENDED VICTIM SEEKS HIDDEN WEALTH

Search for Supposed Fortune of the Late George Feuerhaken Leads Getz into Clutches of the Man Who Deals with Spirits.

With a charge of attempting to obtain money by fraud against him, George F. Martin, an alleged medium and palmist, was taken into custody yesterday afternoon by the police and locked up at the city jail.

Former Governor S. Thomas of Colorado, counsel for James F. Burns, arrived yesterday morning from Denver and made the necessary arrangements with Senator C. G. Saunders and others of Burns' local attorneys to appeal from the decision of Judge Thornell granting James Doyle a new trial.

CLOSE CALL FOR NEW ELEVATOR

Fire Stairs on Roof and Gains Considerable Headway.

The new elevator of the Transmissoria Grain company, now nearing completion at the Union Pacific transfer, had a narrow escape yesterday afternoon from destruction by fire. The fire started on the roof where a force of men was engaged in putting on the tar and gravel coating. In some manner one of the kettles of boiling tar either boiled over or was upset, setting fire to the roof. For a while the flames spread rapidly and worked their way toward the main structure, which is 165 feet high.

Water was hauled to the roof in barrels and a bucket brigade did valiant work until the fire was under control. The fire company. The firemen attached the hose to the steam force pumps of the Peavey elevator and by this were enabled to throw a good strong stream onto the burning roof. The fire was extinguished fortunately with comparatively little damage. It would be estimated that not to exceed \$50 would cover the cost of repairs.

But for the assistance rendered by the management of the Peavey elevator in offering their steam pumps, it is doubtful if the building could have been saved, as by the time the firemen reached the scene the flames had worked down into the bins in the main structure.
