





With the recent perfection of the registry service of the Postoffice department the government is particularly anxious that the general public avail itself of the servlee and is sending out notices advertising

age or letter has been correctly delivered. Every registered package or letter registered at and addressed to a United States postoffice is insured against loss for its value up to \$35.

The system is peculiarly adapted for the transmission of letters or parcels of value, the delivery of which the sender wishes to be assured of by a receipt from the addressee or his agent. In resident districts of the letter carrier postoffices letters and packages of first class matter that are not too cumbersome on account of weight or shape may be registered at the house door

by the carriers as safely as if they were taken to a postoffice. The card of instructions goes on further to direct the proper manner of securing the packages or letters. The registry fee is but 5 cents in addition




