COURT HOLDS IRVINE IS OUT Elected to Fill Out Unexpired Term Instead of for Four Years.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 37 .- (Special.) The state supreme court today rendered decision in the case of W. C. Irvine, state treasurer, against B. B. Brooks, governor, holding that Mr. Irvine was elected to fill out the unexpired term of Henry C. Hay and could serve two years from the time of his election only.

The suit was a friendly one and was brought by Mr. Irvine to have the question passed upon by the supreme court, It was held by some that Irvine was elected for a full term-four years-and that it was the intent of the electors that he should serve four years. Others held that he was elected to serve out the unexpired portion of the Hay term. As the governor was elected to serve the remaining two years of the Richards term his office occupied much the same position as that of the state treasurer and the decision affects defendant and plaintiff alike. As Mr. Irvine cannot be elected to serve two consecutive terms he is now out of the race for renomination.


