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vention of miners resumed the discussion of the resolution offered by President Perry, allowing miners to sign the 1903 scale wherever it is offered by the operators.

President White of the Iowa miners said he was particularly anxious to see the resolution adopted, he believed the Iowa miners would not be confronted by a compact organization of employers and his firm conviction was that the best interests of the miners' organization demanded the adoption of the resolution.

The resolution Mr. Lewis said, meant the miners would give up their old organization which had been perfected at the expense of so much time, energy and money.

Speaking to the Perry resolution, he again appealed to the miners that, if adopted, he said he would have made some changes in it if he had been writing it, but he was certain the best interests of the miners' organization demanded the passage of the resolution.

Mr. Mitchell, President White of the Iowa miners said he thought the Iowa operators would not be so much concerned with the resolution as they were.

President Mitchell said all delegates who were instructed must vote their instructions. He said he thought he had a right to assume authority under great emergency and added:

"And if I am going to continue in this movement then I say that under great public crisis and under great emergency I shall continue, even without your consent, to do what I believe to be best for you and for my country."

At 10:30 Secretary Wilson read the motion of Perry to allow the signing of the advanced scale wherever offered. On a standing vote the resolution was adopted by a large majority, more than 100 delegates voting against it.

Many delegates accepted President Mitchell's suggestion that those who voted in the negative could file their names with the secretary.

A letter from Governor Gooding of Idaho inviting a committee to investigate conditions in the anthracite coal fields, was read by President Mitchell.

The cabinet for some time today had under consideration the coal situation, as disclosed by the proceedings of yesterday.

TREASURERS RETURN FUNDS

County Officials Pay Over \$211,000 Received as Interest on Public Funds.

ACTION TAKEN TO AVOID PROSECUTION. Suits Will Be Filed Against Other Former Officers to Recover Money Illegally Retained by Them.

CINCINNATI, March 30.—The amount of interest on public funds recovered from former treasurers today reached \$211,000, additional amounts from County Treasurer R. K. Hynicka and former Treasurers John H. Gibson and T. R. French increasing the amount voluntarily handed to County Prosecutor Rullison. These three are the only occupants of that office who have thus far responded to Mr. Rullison's request that the amount paid by banks as interest on public deposits be turned over to the county now in order to avoid prosecution and suits for recovery.

Late this afternoon County Prosecutor Rullison and County Legal Adviser Irton, in behalf of the state, filed civil suits against County Treasurer Hynicka and former County Treasurers French and Gibson to recover amounts which it is claimed were paid to them by banks. The suits mention the following sums for recovery: R. K. Hynicka, \$38,500; Tilden R. French, \$24,000; John H. Gibson, \$77,000. Judge Samuel Smith of the common pleas court overruled demurrers filed by attorneys for the three defendants, gave judgment for the state and the amounts were formally announced as paid.

Prosecutor Rullison announced that similar action would be taken against these former county treasurers who have declined to respond to Rullison's request for a settlement.

MINERS LIVE ON HAY. (Continued from First Page.) Tombed men. Renewed salvage operations have begun, the members of the salvage corps carrying provisions in case other survivors should be found.

Another survivor, Lefebvre, when asked if he had slept replied: "We never closed our eyes. Sometimes we dozed, but Nemy, our command, would not permit us to sleep."

Nemy displayed his watch, which he had wound up regularly throughout his imprisonment. The watch was fast and therefore the survivors counted only six ten days from the time of the explosion.

"I have heard Nemy's story, which is correct, except that Nemy forgot the carrots. We found some in a stable and they formed our best meal."

The rescued men are being kept in semi-darkness by the lanterns, which are charged from potatoes poisoning caused by eating the decomposed horse.
