NORRIS DEFENDS HIS BILL

Fifth District Congressman Discusses Measure for Popular Election of Senators.

CAMPAIGNS ARE NOW TOO FREQUENT

Provision Extending the Terms of Representatives to Four Years Will Make Bill Popular in the Senate.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—(Special.)—Judge George Norris, who represents the Fifth Nebraska district in congress, has broken into the inner circles of house legislation.

He has accomplished this by a steadfast desire to be right and his straightforwardness and his ability have given him a prestige in a body which, although made up of 286 members, together with the delegates from the territories, is controlled by a few individuals.

Recently Judge Norris had the honor paid him of having his bill providing for the election of senators by the people and the extension of the term of representatives from two to four years, made the basis for a committee bill, which has been reported favorably from the committee on election of president, vice president and members of congress and is now on the house calendar.

Norris Defends His Bill. In discussing an editorial recently published in The Boy, taking exception to Judge Norris' bill, because of the extended term given to representatives in congress, he made the following statement:

Yes, I have read the recent editorial in The Boy, and I am sorry that it is now before congress to amend the constitution by providing for the election of senators by the people and for the election of members of the house of representatives for a term of four years.
