

PRINTERS' FEE TOO SMALL Des Moines Papers Refuse to Publish Laws at Rate Prescribed by Law. MAY BE CAUSE OF AN EXTRA SESSION

Law Designates Papers and No Authority Given to Have Emergency Measures Printed Elsewhere or to Increase the Fee. (From a Staff Correspondent.)

DEB MOINES, April 7.—(Special.)—Hon. L. Young, editor of the Daily Capital, today informed Secretary of State W. B. Martin that he would not publish in the Daily Capital the laws having publication clauses to them unless paid more than the legal rate. The legal rate is 40 cents a square, which he asserts is considerably under the commercial rate. Laws which it is desired shall go into effect before July 4, at which time they go into force by operation of law, have a publication clause attached to them and it has been customary to make this clause read that the law shall go into force from and after its publication in the Register and Leader and Des Moines Daily Capital, newspapers published in Des Moines, Ia.

Supreme Court Today Affirmed the Case of Harrison County Case. The supreme court today affirmed the case of Harrison county treasurer, H. H. McKisney, county treasurer, in which he was charged with embezzling county funds. He entered a demurrer in the district court which was sustained and the county appealed to the supreme court. The supreme court today sustains the action of the lower court, which found McKisney guilty of the embezzlement. The grounds on which the demurrer to the indictment were sustained were errors in the indictment, the court pointing out that the indictment failed to show whether McKisney's successor had demanded a showing of funds on hand or whether the supervisors had made the demand or whether the alleged embezzlement had been discovered at a quarterly or semi-annual settlement with the supervisors. The law states that it shall be embezzlement if the officer fails to account for the funds to the proper officer. The amount alleged to have been embezzled was \$7,765.50.

Appeals to the Supreme Court. Silas Wilson has appealed to the supreme court the case brought by him against the Board of Public Health for its refusal to issue a license to him for the horticultural department at the exposition. Central Committee Meets. R. H. Spence, chairman of the republican state central committee, has called a meeting of the central committee to be held in this city April 11, at which time the agenda of the state convention and the place will be decided upon. Mr. Spence says a date between August 1 and 15 is likely to be selected.

State Candidates File. Senator W. C. Hayward, candidate for secretary of state, and W. W. Morrow of Atton, candidate for auditor, have filed their candidates' certificates with the auditor of public works, to have their names placed on the primary ballot. Want Sullivan to Run. Democrats of Polk county are asking Jerry B. Sullivan, who was a candidate three years ago against Cummins for governor, to again enter the race for the democratic nomination.

FORT DODGE HAS A BAD BLAZE. Fireman Has Leg Broken and Much Property is Destroyed. FORT DODGE, Ia., April 7.—(Special.)—Fire of unknown origin broke out in the heart of the business part of this city at 2 o'clock this morning. About \$50,000 worth of property was destroyed and two business blocks were wrecked before the flames were checked. The fire started in the upper story of the Feaster block, occupied by a printing office. Two women were rescued from an apartment there. Fireman Lewis had a leg broken in a fall from a building during the fire. David Foster's clothing store was flooded with water and the entire stock was soaked. The adjoining store of Thompson, Kehm & Co., which was opened about three weeks ago with an entirely new stock of clothing, was also drenched with water. It was only by flooding everything within reach that the firemen were able to save the business section of the city from a serious conflagration.

BLOPERS ARE NOT FORGIVEN. Hamburg Girl Returns and Asks in Vain for Parents' Pardon. HAMBURG, Ia., April 7.—(Special.)—The eloping couple, Howard Colon and Betty Hylkine, who ran away last Friday to Kansas City and were married, returned to their home in Hamburg to beg forgiveness of the young wife's parents, who had opposed the marriage. They were denied the pardon, but were allowed to take their belongings to the state where their parents were where they will reside for the present.
