JOHNSON LOSES ONE CASE Supreme Court Passes on Street Car Sults from Cleveland and

Chicago.

WASHINGTON, April 22-The ease of the City of Cleveland against the Cleveland Electric Railway Company was decided to day by the supreme court of the United States in favor of the company, The case involved the right of the city to grant a charter to a new street car line to operate in the face of the contention of the old company that its charter had not expired. The opinion was by Justice McKenna.

Premier Says Either He or Durnovo Must Leave the Cabinet.

LIBERALS WILL CONTROL PARLIAMENT

Repressive Measures of the Reactions ary Element Lunble to Stem Rising Tids of Opposition.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 10.-The steadly swelling thie of liberal successes and the overwhelming victory of the constitutional democrats at Moscow have brought the struggle between reaction and reform

Premier Witte late last night according to information which has reached the Associated Press, again tendered his resignation to the emperor with a clear-cut intimation that the latter must choose, and at once, between him and Minister of the Interior Durnovo. The emperor, according to report, took the resignation under consideration and returned no answer. Since his return from Tsarskoe-Selo last

week, when he pleaded with Emperor Nicholas to heed the voice of the people and grant a written constitution. Premier Witte has brought all possible pressure upon the emperor to divorce himself from tion of the Stars and Stripes. I think now the reactionary cabal and align himself inreservedly with the new school

Events now, as during the great October strike preceding the issuance of the imperial manifesto, have played the premier's game. Every new election has made it clearer that the idea that the imperial Parliament could be held in leading strings utterly futile, and after the receipt of the returns from twenty-eight provinces and Moscow, Count Wifte apparently felt strong enough to play his final card and force the Issue.

Shipoff to Replace Durnovo. If Witte wins he will replace M. Durnovo with M. Shipoff or some other liberal Ignatieff will inherit the ticklish job of wrapper, dealing with the accredited representatives of the nation

The latest dispatches bring little comfort to the conservatives. Reports continue to be favorable to the constitutional democrats. One of the most notable features is the election of Prince Urusoff. Amanda V. Wright has filed a suit for who resigned the vice ministry of the interior to stand for the national Parliament. Michael Stakovitch, the well known zemstvoist, has also been re-elected.

A summary of the official returns up to o'clock this evening shows that fifty constitutional democrats, twenty-six progressives and thirteen unclassified members of the lower house have been elected Pensants Above Station.

With the single exception of Tula, in every province where the peasant class was in the majority, the electoral college captured the majority or the members. Most of them, however, atthough belonging to the peasant class, are actually peasants in name only and have risen far above their station. Electors in Prisons.
