A VINDICATION FOR DOCTOR PIERCE

Decision by the Supreme Court of New York State, Against the Ladies' Home Journal.

A verdict has been rendered in favor of the plaintiff in the libel suit brought against the Ladies' Home Journal (published by the Curtis Publishing) Company) by the WORLD'S DISPENSARY MEDICAL ASSOCIATION, of which DR. R. V. PIERCE is President.

D.; Materia Medica and Therapeutics, by Professor Finley Ellingwood of the Bennett Medical College of Chicago; "New Reme-dies" by Professor Edwin M. Hale, M. D.; Text-Book of Practical Therapeutics, by Dr. Hobart A. Hare, Professor in University of Pennsylvania; Laurence Johnson, M. D., Professor University of New York; Professor John King, Author of Woman and Her Discases; Wm. Paine, M. D., Author of New School Practice of Medicine; Professor John M. Scudder, M. D., Author of a treatise on "The Diseases of Women;" Horatio C. Wood, M. D., Author of Therapeutics; Roberts Bartholow, A. M., M. D., Professor of Materia Medica, Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia.

The retraction printed by the Curtis Publishing Co. two months after the libelous statement appeared stated definitely that analyses had been made at their request and that the "Favorite Prescription" did not contain either alcohol, opium or digitalis. 


