

FULL PROSECUTION IS URGED

Thorough and Vigorous Fight to Punish Election Frauds Demanded.

CANVASSERS CERTAIN OF ILLEGALITY

Petition County Attorney to Do His Best and Latter Already Has Evidence Involving Certain Persons.

Mayor Zimmerman and County and City Treasurer Fink, as majority members of the primary election canvassing board, have prepared a formal report of the frauds discovered in tampered ballots and presented it to County Attorney Sibaugh with a request for a thorough investigation and a determined effort to punish the culpable persons. The report sums up the situation as follows:

1. That in nine precincts we discovered evidence of gross fraud upon the ballot, said precincts being as follows: First precinct, Second ward; Third precinct, Second ward; Second precinct, Fourth ward; Third precinct, Fourth ward; Fourth precinct, Fourth ward; Fifth precinct, Fourth ward; Sixth precinct, Fourth ward; Seventh precinct, Fourth ward; Eighth precinct, Fourth ward; Ninth precinct, Fourth ward; Tenth precinct, Fourth ward; Eleventh precinct, Fourth ward.

That said fraud consisted mainly in careful erasures of the ballots marked for the candidates for city clerk, Sam K. Greenleaf and Mr. Stockham, and the marking of the same ballot for William H. Eibourn, candidate for city clerk. That nearly all said changes were from Greenleaf and Eibourn. That the canvass of votes before the recount in the office of city clerk showed for said Greenleaf by the more ballots than Mr. Eibourn. That if the changed ballots had been counted, Mr. Eibourn, Mr. Greenleaf's plurality would have been overcome and Mr. Eibourn nominated by about seventy votes.

That sometimes the fraud appeared by the filling in of blank ballots for Mr. Eibourn and sometimes by marking of ballots cast for Mr. Greenleaf, also for Mr. Stockham, and said fraud further appeared at times by the erasures of pencil marks over the vote marked for Greenleaf and in other ways.

It is apparent to us that deliberate and premeditated fraud has been perpetrated upon the ballot and that an attempt has been made to defeat Mr. Greenleaf's nomination by the change of ballots cast for him to Eibourn.

That a few ballots were also changed from the candidates for mayor, Mr. Hennings and Mr. Benson, to Mr. French, but not sufficient to have changed the lead of Mr. Hennings from Mr. French.

That there were no changes of the ballots of Eibourn to either Greenleaf or Stockham. We, therefore, recommend and request that the county attorney of Douglas county take up, investigate and prosecute to the best of his ability, those who were guilty of perpetrating this fraud upon the ballot, to the end that justice be done and that in the future the sacred right of the ballot be recognized and enforced and respected by all parties.

Evidence directing suspicion to certain persons whose names are not disclosed, is said to have been uncovered in the alleged ballot fraud investigation being conducted by County Attorney Sibaugh. Witnesses are being examined daily, but the results of the examination will not be given out until complaints are issued or the matter investigated by the grand jury.

"It would be unwise for me to say just what we have found out," said County Attorney Sibaugh Friday. "We have enough evidence to arouse strong suspicion as to at least one suspected party. We are now trying to get conclusive evidence to confirm our suspicion. It is a hard matter to investigate owing to the nature of the crime, but we are going clear to the bottom of it."

FREE HOMES IN MONTANA.

Twenty-seven Townships of Government Land Opened to Filing.

Twenty-seven townships, comprising 622,200 acres in the vicinity of Culbertson, Montana, have recently been opened to filing by the government. Some of these townships lie along the Great Northern railway and others lie along the Big Muddy river. Only the best townships out of a vast area fifty miles square were surveyed. Much of this land is in Paradise valley, contiguous to the Great Northern railway, along the Missouri river and in the Big Muddy valley, but is fine rolling prairie or table land back from the river. This land is situated within from ten to thirty miles of the Dakota and Montana state line, Culbertson being only thirty miles from Buford, N. D.

The ranchers and farmers have raised good crops during the last three years, previous to which stockraising was the only industry. Prof. E. B. Linfield of the Montana experiment station says no better land exists anywhere than there is in the vicinity of Culbertson. Crops are grown here as follows: Oats, fifty to sixty bushels to the acre and forty pounds to the bushel. Flax nine to sixteen bushels to the acre; wheat, fifteen to twenty-five bushels; barley, thirty to forty bushels, and speltz sixty to eighty bushels to the acre. These crops have been raised on new breaking, and as the ground becomes better cultivated the crops will be better. The soil is a black loam averaging twelve inches in depth, with clay subsoil. There is sufficient moisture here to raise a good crop every year without irrigation.

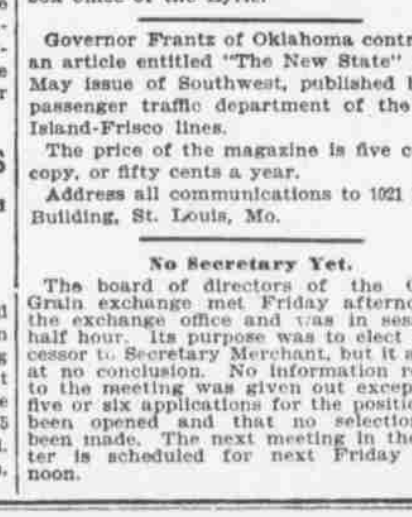
