#### WOMAN SUFFERS FOR CARE

Mrs. Mary Bennett, Sixty-Three Years Old, Falls from Becond Story.

SIX HOURS BEFORE ANY AID REACHES HER

Doctor Who Calls Says He Could Not Afford to Take Charity Casetittle Chance for Life.

injured almost unto death Mrs. Mary Bennett, a woman 63 years of age, living upstairs at 718 North Sixteenth street, lay on her bed from 5:30 a. m. until 1:30 m. Monday without any further medical attention than a sleeping potion. The weman fell from a second-story window early Monday morning and sustained a multiple fracture of right leg, left thigh broken, a compound fracture near left knee and dislocation of other knee. In places the bones protruded the flesh. There are but slight chances for the woman's recovery.

Just where the blame rested for the voman's lack of attention has not been determined. Dr. S. B. MacDiarmid was called soon after the accident occurred He told the woman's relatives of the seriousness of the case, administered the potion, advised that the woman be sent to a hospital and promised to return at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

"About half an hour after I left the place I telephoned back to the house that I was unable to get the patient into any haritable ward and as I cannot afford to take charity cases myself I did not go back. I tried to get the county physician, but failed; City Physician Ralph was in my office between 10 and 10:30 a. m. and I spoke to him of the case," said Dr. Maç-Diarmid in explanation.

Order to the Bospital. At 1:30 Police Surgeon Morsman reached the woman's room and ordered that the patient be sent to a hospital at once, as he feared she would not live long unless

promptly attended. The woman was carried upstairs by her son-in-law, Harry Trenton, Neighbors, both upstairs and downstairs at the address given, stated that Mrs. Bennett's two daughters, Mrs. Trenton and Mrs. Trottleman, drove her out Sunday after-

Mrs. Bennett was taken to Clarkson hospital by order of City Physician Ralph. Detectives Ferris and Dunn are making an investigation of the case, as reports were received that the old woman's daughters and son-in-law were drunk Monday morning. It also was reported they have been receiving aid from the county store house and selling the goods thus received for beer and cocaine.




