

The sheriff alleges that when he was first motified to appear at the mine with deputies there was no necessity for it, and finally when he appeared here he had no success in swearing men, as no one would take the oath. Feeling there would be no serious conflict the sheriff did not compel citizens to become deputies. He said that if he had anticipated any trouble he would have called for state guardsmen, as their appearance would not have been so objectionable to the miners, especially to the foreign element. He was asked repeatedly by Lieutenant Smith to swear in the troopers as deputies, but he refused.

How long Lieutenant Smith's command will remain at the colliery is unknown. President John Fahy and other union leadars of the Ninth district here last night held an extended conference and bitterly criticised the action of the lieutenant and his men in shooting the people. The mine leaders will leave nothing undone to try to place the lieutenant and some of the his men in jail. Following the return to camp of Lieutenant Smith's command following the two battles, three of his men who had been badly clubbed about the body became seriously ill and were removed to the Pottsville hospital.




