

WATER FLOWS IN BIG DITCH

First Section of Interstate Canal is Opened After Ten Months' Work.

MARKS EPOCH IN IRRIGATION HISTORY

Project, When Complete, Will Add Half Million Acres to Productive Area—Forty-Five Miles is Finished.

WHALEN, Wyo., May 5.—(Special Telegram.)—Water was turned into the first section of the Interstate canal today. A special train was run from Elyria, Neb., to the head gates and several hundred people in western Nebraska and eastern Wyoming who are interested in the territory to be reclaimed were present.

The opening of this canal marks an epoch in the history of Wyoming and Nebraska. The completion of the North Platte irrigation project will add 500,000 acres to the productive area of the section in addition to the 150,000 acres already under irrigation.

On this project the government has demonstrated that it can work as rapidly as private enterprises, it being but ten months since the first dirt was shoveled out and two years since the surveys were begun.

The area will provide homes for thousands of farmers with the lands cut up into farm units not to exceed eighty acres each, as provided by the reclamation act, and with intensified diversified agriculture applied will become a veritable Eden.

The section of canal opened today is seventy feet wide and carries thirteen feet of water or 1,500 cubic feet per second. In the course of the brief exercises the contents of three cornucopias were emptied into the stream containing respectively four, five and six bushels, symbolizing the future of the North Platte valley.

DRINK FAMILY QUARREL SUICIDE Farmer Blows His Head Off When Threatened With Arrest.

DANEBROG, Neb., May 5.—(Special.)—John Chalupsky, a farmer residing three miles south of St. Paul, committed suicide by blowing out his brains with a shotgun Thursday night. Temporary insanity caused by drinking is supposed to have been the cause of his action.

TEN ARE KILLED IN WRECK

Fast Train on Pennsylvania Line Collides Near Altoona, Pa.

TWENTY PERSONS MORE OR LESS HURT

Four Died Before They Could Be Removed from Debris and Four Died En Route to the Hospital.

ALTOONA, Pa., May 5.—Ten persons are dead as the result of the head-on collision on the Pennsylvania railroad, near Clover Creek Junction, last night. Six were killed outright and four died as a result of injuries received. About twenty of the passengers and train crew were more or less seriously injured, but as far as is known all will recover.

Names of Injured. The following were seriously injured: Oscar Anderson, Belva, N. D., injured in leg. Captain A. Camp, Harrisburg, Pa., postal clerk, badly bruised and sprained back and hip.

Cause of Wreck. The collision came as a result of a misunderstanding of orders on the part of the engineer of the east-bound train. The two engines ploughed into each other and were wrecked, as was also the coach attached to the Chicago mail train, No. 12, and five mail cars. The latter train was sent south over the Petersburg branch the coach was directly back of the engine.

Passengers Caught in Debris. The passengers were caught under the wreckage by the piling up of the mail cars on the coach. This made it impossible for those not injured to render any aid to those pinned down by the wreckage until the arrival of the wrecking forces.

CHICAGO, May 5.—Byron L. Smith, president of the Northern Trust company of this city, was today appointed receiver of the "Travelers" insurance company by Judge Julian Mack in the circuit court of Cook county.

The company is one of the largest fire insurance companies in the west, and its distress is due to the heavy losses it sustained in the San Francisco fire. The amount of loss is estimated at \$7,400,000. It was stated in the application that the assets of the company will not exceed \$3,300,000.
