In order to test the soundness of Attorney General Brown's opinion that saoon licenses are taxable property a test suit will be started in this county, acording to a statement made by County Attorney Slabaugh Tuesday. Heretofor saloon licenses have not been taxed, but the attorney general recently gave an opinion that the State Board of Equalization has directed local boards to include them in its list of taxable property.

County Attorney Slabaugh has received from Attorney General Brown a letter written to John B. Raper, county attorney of Pawnee county, giving the opinion i detail

He holds saloon licenses to be a form of property having value, and as such should be listed as franchises or special privileges. The value is not necessarily the amount of the license fee, but in fixing the value the assessor should take into consideration the cost, the time it is to continue in force, as well as the profits and losses which might be reasonably anticipated as a result of the business to be carried on under the license. Omaha has between 240 and 250 saloons

paying a license fee of \$1,000 each.
