CHICAGO, May II.—Reports of damage to the fall-sown crop by dry weather caused strength today in the local wheat market. At the close prices were at the highest point of the day, the July option being up 19-2019c. A feature of trading in corn was a 74-2 advance in the price of the May option, due to covering by shorts. That delivery closed at a net gain of 19-2. July corn was up 1/2. Oats showed a gain of 1/2. Provisions were 21/2 to 7/2 higher.

The wheat market was strong for the greater part of the day but the strength was much pronounced during the last half of the session. Trading was more active than for some time past, many outside interests buying freely. At the opening pit traders were bearishly inclined because of favorable weather conditions, but the market was held steady by small receipts in the northwest. The majority of these reports came from St. Louis and Kansas thy small were accompanied by orders to buy wheat. Several of the leading commission houses were good buyers and this started an active general demand, which cartied prices up over a cent. Selling was chiefly by longs. The market closed strong, only opened a shade lower to a shade higher at 800,800 kg, sold at 79% 680c and advanced of 315-6315 kg. The close was at \$15 kg. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 2,000,000 hu. Primary receipts were 144,000 let., against 10,000 bu, for the corresponding day one year ago. The movement from the country is very small, local arrivals today being only 52 cars, of which number 15 cars were of contract grade. Not until the price of May had been advanced to 45c, which was 12c above the low point of the day, was the demand of the most urgent hidders satisfied. On profittaking the price dropped back to 45c, where it closed firm, final quotations showing a net gain of 15c. Future deliveries were strengthened by the advance in May and closed strong. LONDON, May 11.—Money was much wanted in the market today for Stock exchange payments and rates were slightly harder. Discounts were easy. On the Stock exchange, though the volume of business was not increased, the tone was dissinctly more cheerful and there was less apprehension regarding the settlement, which was being concluded satisfactorily, while the transfer of \$2,50,000 in gold from the Indian secretary to the Bank of England's reserve helped in the moderate improvement of consols and other first-class stocks. Americans fluctuated narrowly in the morning, but moderate professional buying hardened quotations to a fraction over parity. Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk were supported on the traffic returns. In the afternoon Wall street advices caused a sharp improvement and the market closed firm with Missouri Padific the feature. Foreigners were supported by Paris and hardened, especially Russians. Japanese imperial 5s of 1904 were quoted at 1014, Kaffirs had a better tone in French purchases.

PARIS. May II.—Prices on the Bourse today were very firm, the opening of the Russian Parilament having produced an excellent impression. Russian imperial 4s were quoted at \$3.15 and Russian bonds of 1904 at \$6. The private rate of discount was 2% per cent.

BERLIN, May II.—On the Bourse today trading was light. Russians improved on the favorable view taken of the Parliament at St. Petersburg.

The greater part of choice carpet wools have been taken by manufacturers, but the poorer ones left are held very firmly.
