Values Are Higher Early in the Day, but Reaction Soon Sets In. AMALGAMATED COPPER LEADS DECLINE. This Stock Has Been Used to Support the Market and When It Gives Way the Entire List Follows.

NEW YORK, May 14.—The early stock market today gave no evidence of a change from the languid tendency of last week, but before the day was over a clearly defined reactionary tendency developed. An explanation which seems sufficient to satisfy the professional trading view was that the recovery from the depression following the San Francisco calamity had run its due course.

Wheat gained today, only to close very nearly at the advance. Liverpool cables came lower and the world's shipments were much larger than anticipated. There was some selling at the start and a decline of 1/4 cent from Saturday. A decrease of 2,000,000 bushels in the visible supply and a corresponding increase in the crop, together with a report that the weather was causing the reaction on wheat, which went up to the high point of the day. The forecast for the southwest was for probable showers. The cash demand at Minneapolis was reported as being the best of the crop, but the premium being paid for the best grain. Longs realized on the advance and prices weakened. The close on May was higher and the market on Duluth reported 250,000 bushels being closed to go to Chicago on May contracts.

Professional traders have been feeling the tug of the market for a number of days by making tentative short sales and trying to turn the market downward. There was no real panic, however, in the situation to warrant a renewal of positive depression in the speculative outlook. With the turn in the direction of the market there was an inevitable change in the temper of the speculation and some revival of consideration was given to a number of factors which were prominent at the time of the downward course in prices. The news of a large temporary loan by the Pennsylvania company and the reports current of high state of interest to be paid on the call, called renewed attention to the heavy capital requirements yet to be met in the money market.
