MAGNATES MEET IN OMAHA SATURDAY

Rourke is Assured of Support by Majority of Managers for Decency and Fair Play.

O'Neil, too, has been advised of the meeting to oust him, as has every manager of the Western league, and he can do as he pleases. The meeting will be held and he will be the man to face the situation if things go as scheduled. Here is what this man O'Neil wired back to Rourke: "Wire Tebeau for him and Cantillon to meet you in Omaha Saturday."

"What do you think of that? Who's Tebeau?" The magnates of the Western league— that is, the managers of the various teams, will hold a meeting in Omaha, which has for its prime purpose the ousting of the so-called President O'Neil and the consequent suppression of Mike Cantillon, the hoodlum manager of Des Moines. This meeting is brought about through the initiative of President Rourke of the Omaha team, but is jointly called by Duncan of Sioux City, Holmes of Lincoln and Selee of Pueblo.

After the highway robbery and outrageous conduct of Cantillon and his brother hoodlums, Rourke, at Vinton Street park Rourke sent a letter to the various managers of the league calling them to join him in a final protest for the salvation of the league. That night Holmes telephoned and wired his support, the next morning Duncan telephoned his and Thursday morning came favorable word from Selee.

Burke Will Be Here. While Manager Rourke has heard nothing from Burke, that dignitary has wired that he will attend the meeting, but will not commit himself until "I know the facts." This message is sent to Lincoln newspaper man, who wired to Rourke what he was going to do. Rourke sent him word Thursday by wire, so that whatever excuse the Denver man may offer he cannot hide behind the argument that he was not called or that snap judgment was taken him out of the meeting. It is understood: Not only has Bill Rourke called a meeting of the league managers, but every manager save Burke and Cantillon has called the meeting. Each of the others has sent the same message to Burke, and as the thing is set, the die is cast. Mr. Burke and Cantillon, who do as they please; with the other four men hanging together, as they now pledge, there'll be no more O'Neil—the league will have a real president; there'll be no more Cantillon, for misery loves company, and it won't be long until the hoodlum manager will seek congenial companionship. The era of decency and fair play to which the fans of this circuit have longingly looked for years, seems to be at hand.
