PLOT TO ASSASSINATE THE KING. London Evening Standard Prints Circumstantial Story. LONDON, May 30.—5:33 p. m.—A plot to assassinate King Alfonso on his wedding day has been discovered in London, according to an unconvincing story published by the Evening Standard this afternoon. Fifty anarchists of England, France and Spain, who are said to be concerned in the conspiracy are alleged to be on their way to Madrid with the intention of carrying out the attempt, as the king is leaving the church. The plan is said to have been hatched in Spain and London, and it is added that the police cut wind of the affair and will take all the precautions necessary to protect the king. The project, it is asserted, included a revolution after the assassination with the view to overthrowing the monarchy. The Evening Standard further asserts that Spanish officers are implicated in the plot.

CROWDS AT MILITARY MASS. Six Thousand People Attend Solemn Requiem at Holy Sepulcher.

FATHER COLANERI ACTS AS CELEBRANT. Under Auspices of Knights of Columbus Impressive Memorial Service of Catholic Church is Rendered for Nation's Dead.

Six thousand persons sat or stood on the hillside at Holy Sepulcher Society Wednesday morning, facing the great white altar which had been erected there, while Rev. A. M. Colaneri conducted solemn military requiem mass, and while Rev. M. J. Connor, told of the deeds of soldier heroes and bespoke reverence for them.

It was a solemn and impressive spectacle, and a beautiful one, the warm sunbeams streaming down on the richly embroidered robes of the priests and the white vestments of the acolytes and the incense boys, as they performed the services of a mass, and incensed with burning incense, and wafted with beads of the thousands before the altar. The purple robes of Bishop Scannell, who took part in the mass, and sat under the altar's canopy, lent some color to the scene in the foreground.

Chief Deacon's uniform and Sergeant Hayes led a platoon of police, who looked after the disposal of the crowd in an admirable manner. Prelates at the Altar. Father Colaneri was assisted in the celebration of the mass by Father Aherne as deacon, Father Moriarty as subdeacon and the Rev. J. J. O'Connor, who acted as cantor. Bishop Scannell also took part in the celebration.

At 10 o'clock a procession formed near the entrance to the grounds and marched to the altar. It was made up of the Thirtieth Regiment band, the Omaha Guards, the Thirtieth Regiment of forty-two soldiers from all the Catholic churches, and fifty of the clergy, among whom was Bishop Scannell. After a short program of national airs the mass was celebrated with the usual pomp and circumstance, which will never be forgotten. Throughout the service Lieutenant Purdy and six of the Omaha Guards served as a guard of honor in front of the altar. The Omaha Guards and the Thirtieth Regiment fired a salute to the dead.
