MICHIGAN WINS THE MEET

Wolverine University Team Takes Western Intercollegiate Championship.

POLE VAULT RECORD MADE

Indiana Athlete Clears the Bar at 12 Feet 47-8 Inches-Chicago is Second and lows Normal Third.
