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ECHOES OF THE ANTE-ROOM

Modern Woodmen of America.

What promises to be the largest gathering in Nebraska will take place at the Auditorium in this city on Wednesday evening, when the Modern Woodmen of America camp will hold their annual convention.

Not only will every camp in the three counties be represented by large delegations but extensive bands will accompany the train with several hundred Modern Woodmen and three drill teams.

A special train is being scheduled to arrive at Plattsmouth with a band, drill team and a large delegation of Modern Woodmen, while another camp from Blair, Western Iowa will also send large delegations.

The train will extend over two days. Beginning Wednesday evening, a parade will start from the corner of Nineteenth and Franklin streets at 7:30 under command of Major J. M. Richards. This will be composed of about twenty drill teams, several bands and a large number of Modern Woodmen.

The exercises at the Auditorium will begin at 8 o'clock and will be given by J. H. Van Dusen of South Dakota, J. M. Richards of Blair, and J. L. Landon, head consul of the Modern Woodmen of America, who will preside at the event of the gathering. The initiation of the class of candidates, for which, up to the present time, the application has been secured. This will be the largest class of candidates ever initiated into a fraternal order in the history of the state.

The full ritualistic work of the society will be completed by the Forester team of camp No. 12, which is conceded to be one of the best drill teams in the United States, having won prizes in various national and international exhibitions.

Thursday evening a banquet will be held at the Thill Hotel, which will be very largely attended by national officers of the Modern Woodmen of America.

The head officers who are expected to attend the meeting are: Head Consul A. J. Whidden, National Forester C. W. Haves of Rock Island, Ill.; Head Banker McMiller of Mason City, Ia.; Directors E. W. Weaver of Plattsmouth, Neb.; J. Byrnes of Michigan, Head Physician Cook of Plattsmouth, Neb.; Deputy Head Consul E. E. Kester of Lincoln.

The arrangements for the rally are in charge of the Modern Woodmen of America promotion committee of Douglas county, which includes Barney Harris, president; George B. Wainwright, secretary; and William Nollman, treasurer.

The Modern Woodmen of America of Douglas county are planning to take part in the celebration to be held in the Auditorium next week.

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
