Export Trade in Latter Poor, with Seaboard Reporting Further Cancellations Abroad-Onts Are Bought on Snow's Report.

The opening easiness in wheat was followed by steadiness and some advance. The strength in the coarse grains had a beneficial influence in the absence of any great amount of strictly "wheat" news. Foreign markets were closed. Snow's report shows condition of winter wheat June 1 to be 86.8, against his figures of 3! has month. He notes the lowering of the prospects by drouth in the Ohio and Missouri valleys, but states the plant is vigorous and that the late rains have resulted in rapid recovery.

Firmness was characteristic of the corremarket during the greater part of the session. July selling 4c higher. Realising above this figure caused a closing reaction. The domestic demand is fair, but the export trade is poor, with the seaboard reporting higher cancellations of sales abroad. The coast market was higher at the start, but closed with little change.

Oats were bought on the Enow report, which shows a condition of 90.8, against his figures of 98.8 last year. He states the prospects for the crop in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missourt and Kanssa as poor, but, on the other hand, the studios is said to be exceedingly favorable in Wisconsin, Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota and the Dakotas.

Seaboard exporters have been caught short of corn for loading the first half of June. Their buying at Chicago the last two days has been for shipment within five to seven days, which shows that they have waited for the May to get out of the way in expectation of a decline in prices. But the buying has all come at once and with light stocks prices have advanced both for cash and futures.
