

LINCOLN WINS IN ELEVENTH

Statement Takes Superb Game Because Omaha Cannot Hit Pop Eyer.

HERMAN LONG MAKES BRILLIANT DEBUT

Old Favorite Covers Second and Captains the Team, Playing in Form That Inspires and Wins.

Pop Eyer was the chief factor in Omaha's defeat by Lincoln at Vinton street park yesterday, where superb ball playing was exhibited for eleven fast innings.

Homeless' outings won by a score of 3 to 1. Eyer let few balls go into the outfield.

It has been some time since Omaha fans have had the opportunity of seeing a good game of ball. It was clean and swift from the start. Umpire Fuller was off at times on balls and strikes, but evidently tried to be fair and neither side had any kick over the other.

Herman Long was in the game for Omaha at second, taking his place as captain. If Long means to keep up to the standard he fixed for himself yesterday it will result in good things for Omaha, for the veteran played just as he did in the years gone by when he was the idol of Boston and king of shortstops.

Lincoln's second was made with two men out. In the eleventh inning Holmes hit for a base. Quillan and Ketchum were easy outs, and Jack Thomas, after Ducky got to second, lifted the ball out into left field for two bases. Had not Hanes exerted a noble effort to catch Holmes at the plate Thomas would have held on first.

Omaha made its run in the seventh inning. Perring got it. He drove the ball out into right, his second hit; and Collins, in running for it, slipped and fell, while the ball bounded over his head. Gonding sent it out into deep center and Perring scored, though merely by a hair's breadth, for he was not back on third when the ball was caught, giving Ketchum a start on him.

Old Pop Eyer is charged with having passed two men at the same steady, cool, heady old rascal, and Omaha fans enjoy to see him work even if he does throw in the hoodoo once in a while. Joe Dolan was in most evidence with his fifteen putouts, not a miss and two hits.

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REPORT ON THE EARTHQUAKE

Commissioner Submits Preliminary Statement of San Francisco Disaster.

POSITION OF THE COAST RANGE CHANGED

Latitude and Longitude of All Points Permanently Moved a Few Feet and Further Study Recommended.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 4.—The preliminary report of the State Earthquake Investigating commission was received yesterday at the office of Governor Pardee. Under the heading of the results the report says:

One of the remarkable features of the coast ranges of California is a line of peculiar geomorphic construction which extends obliquely across the entire width of the mountainous belt, from Mendocino county to Riverside county.

The movements that produced the line are attributed to separate earthquakes, extending back into the quarternary period. In general terms, the causes of these movements are attributed to the theory that stresses are generated in the earth's crust and accumulate until they exceed the strength of the rocks composing the crust and find relief in a sudden rupture.

The evidence of the rupture and of the differential movement is clearly defined in a continuous furrow in the surface soil several feet wide. The average horizontal displacement is twenty feet wide.

Geographical Change. In Sonoma and Mendocino counties there is a different vertical movement not exceeding four feet. The report adds:

In consequence of this movement, it is probable that the position of all points in the coast range have been permanently changed a few feet. There has already occurred a change in the position of the coast range which has been relatively passive, while the "made" ground in their vicinity was profusely and in great part, provided in the evolution of the earth's crust, but also to our knowledge of the means of minimizing the calamities which result from the destruction of buildings and water pipes when such shocks occur in the future.
