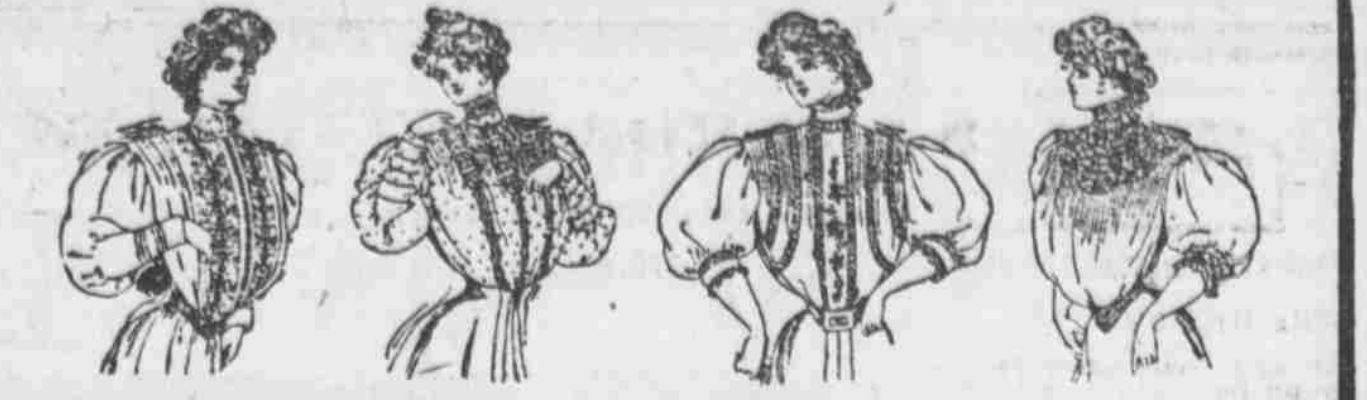

STRANGER IS FOUND DEAD

Headless Body of Man Picked Up on Railroad in Nebraska City.

NEBRASKA CITY, June 15.—(Special Telegram.)—Early this morning the body of an unknown man was found on the Missouri Pacific track near North Tenth street. The man had evidently been struck by a south-bound train near North Eleventh street and his body dragged about 100 yards. The body is mangled and the head is missing, so that it may never be identified.

Grand Island Man Hangs Himself. GRAND ISLAND, Neb., June 15.—(Special.)—Samuel Yost, aged about 45 years and single, committed suicide by hanging himself to a tree at the rear of Hann's park near the base ball grandstand. A number of young boys were playing on the grounds when a foul happened to go over the stand. One of the young fellows went around the stand and there almost ran into the form of the man, whose toes were then just touching the ground. The lad was so badly scared that for some time he was unable to talk. The authorities were at once notified and cut down the body. No inquest was regarded necessary.
