MECCA FOR RUNAWAY COUPLES. Ohio Town Offers Every Modern Convenience for Elopers to Hitch Up.

Youngtown, O., Mecca of the runaway couples of Pittsburg and western Pennsylvania, as well as those who are too shy, in the first blush of their matrimonial bliss, to brave the chaffing and the gibes of friends and boon companions.

Here is a letter that was received in reply to an answer to the advertisement:

"Dear Sir: Fill out the application for marriage license, return it to us and sell us on just what train and what railroad you will be.

"You will note that it is not necessary to get parents' consent when bride-to-be is over 18 years of age.

"My instructions to you are the following: Included you will find a little badge, which you will wear on the right lapel of your outdoor coat when you get off the train, and if you come on the Pittsburg & Lake Erie, get off at Lake Shore Junction.

"In order to keep this absolutely quiet, it is necessary that you do not mention anything of the kind to the railroad men on the train, or you will get 'buncoed' sure.

"I guarantee to keep this out of the newspapers, and no publicity of any kind or description will creep in.

"P. S.—There were 1,500 couples from Pennsylvania married here in 1905, 1,200 in 1904, without any newspaper publicity."

Included with all the nuptial lore is a little brochure, issued by the Chamber of Commerce of Youngstown, extolling the virtues of that city as a manufacturing and commercial center offering extraordinary advantages to newly married couples.

A little inquiry and a little figuring at Youngtown show the money-making possibilities of the enterprise. The fee for issuing a marriage license in Ohio is 75 cents. The buying of an engraved or engrossed certificate is optional, as the blank furnished with the license meets all legal requirements. There is no fixed fee for performing the ceremony where ministers officiate, but a justice of the peace or magistrate cannot demand more than \$2. A balance sheet for the matrimonial agency would show a net profit to agency of \$15.

The Lake Shore Junction referred to in the letter of advice is some distance from the downtown stations and business section of the city, and is not frequented by the hackmen. The elopers can use it to excellent advantage in avoiding publicity and in escaping the persistent downtown hustlers—Pittsburg Dispatch.

QUAKE LETTERS CARRIED FREE. Postoffice Rules and Record Broken After the San Francisco Earthquake.

One thing about the San Francisco earthquake and fire which interests government employees is the fact that for the first time the civil war Uncle Sam disregarded entirely the postoffice regulations.

On the morning of the earthquake and for several days afterward people wrote letters and mailed them wherever they could, and the postoffice employees who stuck to it right through, collected them and sent them ahead without postage.

There is a regulation of the Postoffice department that any soldier or sailor in active government service may have a letter franked through without postage by his officers and it will be delivered, but the recipient must pay the postage upon delivery at the regular rate.

In the civil war there was considerable confusion in the matter of franking. Sometimes the recipient paid, and sometimes a mislaid marked "soldier's letter" went through without pay at all the other end.

But since the civil war never delivered any considerable body of mail free up to the time of the San Francisco earthquake, it measures the extent of this calamity, the confusion into which a great city was thrown, that the postoffice should have cut its red tape in this particular.

The heads of the branch postoffices in New York were puzzled to know whether to deliver these letters without payment or whether to exact the ordinary 2 cents an ounce in the case of the soldier letters.

In most cases they let San Francisco letters go free.—New York Sun.
