Jaffray and McCartney Are Center of Attraction in Finals.

GREAT INTEREST IN TODAY'S OUTCOME

The wise ones failed to pick the winners in the semi-finals of the St. Louis club championship at the field club Friday in the matches between Johnston of Minneapolis and McCartney of Denver and Abbott of Omaha and Jaffray of Minneapolis. Johnston had been playing such a steady, consistent game that most of the followers of the sport had picked him to win the title. He was to have won from McCartney, who had such phenomenal luck in his match with the champion, Warren Dickinson, Thursday afternoon, when he made three putts at the finish, one of 25, the next 20 and the last 12 yards. Abbott also had failed to get an 89 or an 88, but he was able to get his colors, but Jaffray knew his game and went after Abbott from the start, winning the first three holes straight.

**Speculation as to Finals.**  
The finals in the championship consists of 36 holes, the first 18 this morning and the second 18 this afternoon. There is considerable speculation as to who will win the title. The odds are in favor of McCartney, who has been playing a remarkable golf and both seem to be strong at match play. The match next in importance is between the two "Mikes," Mike Moran, Jr., of St. Paul and "Mike" Thomas of the Field club. This match is considered as close that none dare to pick the winner. The odds are in favor of the directors' prize and Hawkins of Des Moines will play A. L. Reed of the Country club for the secretary's prize.

The St. Paul team won out in the team race against bogey, H. P. Bend bringing in the best score of the day. The match between Jaffray and Abbott, the star of the Country club.
