HARVARD WINS VARSITY RACE Orimson Eight Finishes a Length Ahead of the Blue.

YALE TAKES THE TWO MINOR RACES

Freshmen and Four-Oared Contests Go to the Sons of Ell-Weather **Conditions** Favorable to

Harvard.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 38 -- Harvard university triumphed over Yale today befors the greatest crowd that ever gathered here on a race day. Coming after years of defeat the victory was particularly sweet to the crimson. It was a great Yale crew that Harvard defeated, a crew that had, broken all records in practice, and went to the stake boat a favorite. Tonight. Harvard's joy is unconfined.

Harvard won, but Yale rowed a race that will live long in the annals of college sports. Not only from the start until the last sixteenth of a mile did the shells cease to lap each other. The men in the rival sonts, could see each other for more than three miles and a half, as first one coxewain and then the other called upon his crew. Harvard really got the lead when the killing pace proved too much for two of the Yale men. In the final spurt Boulton | and Noves were done, their cars literally slipping away from them. Harvard won the race by less than two lengths and a half. Its time was 23:02; Yale's, 22 11.
