> The feeling is general among the grain duced to withdraw its rate, the Illinois Central should publish at once a pro portional rate of 10 cents per 100 pounds on corn from Omaha to Memphis. In the general adjustment of grain rates to which all the Omaha and Kansas City lines have been committed, the agreed difference between Omaha and Kansas City on Memphis business is 1 cent per 100 pounds, but the action of the 'Frisco widens this difference to 4 cents, and in order to maintain the proper difference, there is a feel ing the Illinois Central ought to make the

> 10 cent rate. It is true the Rock Island has a linfrom Omaha to Memphis, but being under the same control as the 'Frisco, it would take no action detrimental to a member of its own family. NO KICK ON THE UNION PACIFIC Grain Men Are Satisfied with Aboli-No dissatisfaction was expressed about

the Grain exchange Saturday over the announcement of the Union Pacific that It would pay an elevation allowance of 1% cents per 100 pounds on grain transferred at the Omaha elevators. Nels B. Updike. whose elevators are on the Northwestern and the Burlington, said there was no rea son for any kick among the grain men until it was seen what the other roads would do. If the Union Pacific allowed for transfer and the other roads didn't, he said, the elevators on other roads at competing points would be at a disadvantage, He thought it probable the other roads would follow the Union Pacific.

Grain men who have elevators along the Colon Pacific, as well as the Grain exchange in general, are well pleased with the announcement, because all dealers along the road are now plainly on an equal basts. The suggestion is made that other roads may try to pay an elevator allowance at Chicago instead of Omaha, but in that ase the aid of the courts could be invoked o protect the Omaha market.
