THAW MARRIED IN EUROPE. Wife of Man Held for Murder Says Ceremony Was Performed Abroad. WEDDING IN PITTSBURG SECOND SERVICE Was Performed at Suggestion of Thaw's Mother—Statement of Dead Valet is Contradicted by Wife.

NEW YORK, July 3.—"When the time comes I shall be only too glad to talk and tell all I shall not finish the ordeal, nor will I break down. My one thought now is to be of service to my husband." This statement was made by Mrs. Harry K. Thaw just before she was admitted to see her husband at the Tombs today and is the first time she has consented to talk of her probable attitude in the coming trial of Thaw for the murder of Stanford White.

THAW RECEIVES MANY LETTERS. Former Judge Olcott, Thaw's chief counsel, had a conference with his client this afternoon. He was accompanied by a Mr. Keck, who is said to be the attorney for the Thaw family at Pittsburgh. When Judge Olcott left he carried with him a bundle of about seventy letters, which Thaw had received through the mails. Judge Olcott stated that owing to the number of letters sent daily to Thaw he would have some member of the law firm open them in the future before they reach him and thus save the young man considerable annoyance.

THAW'S MOTHER HEARS NEWS. TILBURY, England, July 3.—The news of the tragedy in the Madison Square roof garden, New York, June 23, when Harry Thaw shot and killed Stanford White, had been communicated to his mother, Mrs. Thaw, when the Atlantic transport line steamer Minneapolis, from New York June 23, docked here this morning. Extraordinary precautions were taken on board to keep any inkling of the tragedy from her until relatives were able to break the news. Mrs. Thaw, who had been unusually cheerful throughout the voyage, was met by her son-in-law, the earl of Yarmouth, and Blair Thaw, who came to Tilbury to welcome her, and her face was wreathed in smiles when she learned the news. Mrs. Thaw, who had been communicated to her while on the train bound for London.

As she stepped ashore Mrs. Thaw was surrounded by friends and detectives, the latter being detailed to prevent any stranger from approaching her. After handing Mrs. Thaw and her party aboard a special train, which reporters were expressly excluded. The wireless news was first received off Cape Cod. The captain took it to Miss Copely, who is traveling with Mrs. Thaw and has her confidence, and the report of the tragedy spread among the passengers. Nevertheless, it did not reach Mrs. Thaw. When the newspapers were taken on board the Minneapolis at Gravesend this morning the captain ordered that all reference to the tragedy be omitted from papers, but she did not ask any questions.

As the train pulled out of the station Mrs. Thaw was still smiling, apparently being in continued ignorance of the tragedy. The earl of Yarmouth said that he had broken the news to her until they reached the house. She narrowly escaped hearing the news at the docks. While the earl of Yarmouth was talking to the American press representatives a reporter for an English newspaper attempted to speak to Mrs. Thaw, but the earl intervened first in time to save her from getting the first news from a stranger.

It is probable that Mrs. Thaw will go to Switzerland and not return to America immediately, as her health is poor. Edward Thaw is coming here from Switzerland.

WANTED TO SEE FIREMEN WORK. Boy Sets Fire to House, but It is Discovered Before Much Damage is Done. A desire on the part of a neighbor's little boy to see the fire department at work cost Z. W. Mr. Avery stated that his house, aged about 12 years, living next door to him, got fire to his house Tuesday, but the blaze was discovered and extinguished with only \$1 or \$2 damage, without the aid of the fire department.
