Court Bolds, That Blates Law Does SOCIALISTS TO START SCHOOL NEW YORK, July 6 .- Judge Holt, in the Germana Will Instruct Youth United States supreme court, today handed down an opinion the effect of which was to dismiss the indictments found against Nathan Guilford, vice president, and F. S. Pomeroy, traffic manager of the New York Central railroad, and C. Goodlee and Edwin Earle, the latter sugar merchants of Detroit, charging them with conspiracy to violate the provisions of the Elkins rebating act, punishable by imprisonment. The court, however, also holds that the indictments against the New York Central road. Guilford and Pomeroy, found under the Elkins act are good and sustains them so far as they are punishable by fine.

In sustaining the demurrer to the conspiracy indictments and dismissing the demurrer to the other indictments the court solds that congress did not intend violafous of the Elkins law to be punishable Imprisonment. The conspiracy indictment was returned under a federal enactment entirely separate and distinct from the Elkins act. WHITE AND MRS. HARRY THAW GARFIELD FOR ROSEWATER

Chanffeur of Dead Man Says They Were on Friendly Terms Regently

NEW YORK, July 6-Mrs. Harry K. Thaw's visit to her husband in the Tombs prison was very brief. She remained scarcely more than, ten minutes in the prison, and after leaving there went to the offices of her husband's attorneys. That Mrs. Thaw and Stanford White were on friendly terms up until last September is the assertion made in a signed statement given out today by John Burns. who was employed by White as a chauffeur. Burns says in his statement that on two occasions, once in February and again in September, 1906, the electric cab which he drove was placed at Mrs. Thaw's disposal by White. The first of these occasions was before her marriage, the second was five months after it. In each instance, according to the chauffeur, she was taken from a restaurant to her hotel, and in neither case did White accompany her. Dr. Allan McLane, the alienist, who has been retained by the defense, spent nearly two hours with Thaw today. Upon leaving the prison he said that he had examined Thaw at the request of counsel for the defense. He would say nothing, however, regarding the result of the examina

Allen had a narrow escape from death by drowning, the winds that prevailed Wednesday having blown his balloon a long distance from shore. Until news of his arrival here became known it had been thought that he had met his death, as it was known that at the last time he was sighted on Wednesday evening he was traveling out to sea.

That Allen is alive tonight is due wholly to a fortunate shift of the wind. When he made his ascension at Providence on Wednesday the wind was blowing a brisk breeze from the southwest. The aeronau was carried in his balloon in a northeasterly direction and named over the town of Attleboro. He had his balloon under per feet control at that time and while in the vicinity of Attleboro he descended twice. From Attleboro the airship traveled in the direction of Brockton, and the last seen of the aeronaut by observers on shore was when he passed over Scituate early in the evening. At that time the balloon was headed straight out to sea. The jury empaneled by Coroner Armstrong of Sarpy county, Nebraska, failed to arrive at a verdict. Two of the jury declined to join in a verdict condemning either the street railway company or the anusement company operating the resort, while the other members were as decided in returning a verdict holding both of them responsible. The coroner announced that he would summon another jury and resume the inquest early next week.

The above is the full text of the verdict rendered by the coroner's jury at the inquest hold Friday in Council Bluffs by Dr. V. L. Treynor, coroner of Pottawattamie county, Iowa, over Mary West of that city and the other five victims of the disaster at the Kurssal, Lake Manaws, on the Fourth of July.

The jurors were Ovide Vien, C. C. Clifton and A. M. Hutchinson, all of Council Bluffs.

Attorney C. M. Harl of the legal firm of Harl & T nley represented the atreet reilway company and the Manawa Amusement company, while the state of Iowa was represented by Attorney assistant county attorney of Pottawattamie county.
