HE COULDN'T GO TO WAR Wisconsin Patriot Makes Ample Amends for Inability to Enlist.

Z. G. Simmons of Kenosha, Wis., heard his country's call in 1861 to save its life. 19s was 32 years old, full of energy, and doing well in material ways. But when he tried to enlist in the army the surgeons said he was not well enough or strong enough to be a soldier.

Denied the opportunity to offer his life on the battlefield to keep all the stars in Old Glory's asure field, he determined to do what he could. Week by week, and month by month, and year by year he set aside a portion of his income for the nation, giving it not as a tax exacted by

And apparently the more he gave the more he had to give. The more he spent for his country and its defenders the more he prospered. He was able to be a large contributor to the monument which the Grand Army of the Republic erected to Dr. Stephenson, its founder. He was able to spend \$12,000 on medals for soldiers, and \$25,000 on a memorial to the soldiers of his own county, in addition to countless personal benefactions whose total is unknown but certainly runs into scores of thousands.

Ten or twelve years ago he began to entertain on some summer day all the old soldlers who would come. At first the invitations were confined to Kenosha. Later they were extended to neighboring towns, and finally to Milwaukee and Chicago as well. For the comfort and entertainment of the guests ample provision is made. The last of these "birthday celebrations."
