

DUMA STRIKES BACK

Lower House Asks Czar to Explain Proclamation to Peasants.

PARLIAMENT PUT IN FALSE LIGHT

People Told That Members Are Withholding Emperor's Bounty.

CROWDS ARE DISPERSED BY THE POLICE

Energetic Fight Between Mobs and Cossacks Near Moscow Station.

SIX MORE NEWSPAPERS CONFISCATED

Liberals in Doubt as to Meaning of Late Conversion of General Treppoff to Parliamentary Plan.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 9.—The initial steps toward the adoption of a direct address to the country to counteract the impression the government's communications with regard to the settlement of the agrarian question are making a marked impression.

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The interpellation was referred to a commission which is expected to recommend the issuance of a counter appeal setting forth the views and intentions of Parliament.

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Count Mukhan, president of the house agrarian commission, dilated on how the law which the commission was now elaborating was handicapped by the circulation of the emperor's proclamation.

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ROOT SPEAKS AT SAN JUAN

Secretary of State Guest of Honor at Luncheon at Union Club.

SAN JUAN, P. R., July 9.—Ethel Root, the American secretary of state, who arrived here yesterday on board the cruiser Charleston on his voyage to Rio Janeiro as the representative of the American government at the Pan-American congress, was entertained at luncheon today by George Cabot Vard at the Union club.

Others present included United States and Insular officers, the naval officers of Porto Rico and several Spanish merchants and bankers.

Auditor Hyde of Porto Rico proposed the toast to President Roosevelt. In responding Mr. Root said he fully appreciated the difficulties attending the island's adjustment to the new conditions, resulting from its separation from Spain and the severance of relations between church and state.

The United States, Mr. Root said, is deeply interested in the welfare of the island, and in holding its friendship, and strongly desired for Porto Rico the utmost prosperity and happiness.

Mr. Root avoided all reference to insular problems, such as the question of citizenship, the coffee growing industry and the presence of troops on the island.

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NEW AUDIT SYSTEM PUT IN

Reform in Checking Police Court Account Adopted by Crawford.

Retiring Clerk Reimburses Treasury When Advised of Discrepancies Comptroller's Office Did Not Discover.

An investigation instituted by Police Judge Crawford into the system of accounting which has been in vogue for some time in the office of the clerk of the police court has revealed some suspicious methods of auditing.

One feature of the investigation was that last Friday afternoon Lee Grier, who retired from the police court clerkship last month, paid into the city treasury \$24 to cover discrepancies discovered that day by Police Judge Crawford and the present clerk of the police court, J. J. Mahoney.

The \$24 represented the balance of the city treasury which was credited to Grier's account on January 1 of this year to date, which covered Judge Crawford's time at the police court.

Inasmuch as representatives of the city comptroller's office checked up Mr. Grier's accounts from month to month and discovered no errors, while the new police judge discovered \$24 short for the six months checked, the matter has aroused the attention of the city council.

Concussion McGovern has said he will ask that Grier's books for his six years as clerk of the police court be checked by experts.

New System of Accounting. Beginning yesterday morning a new system of keeping accounts was inaugurated at the police court and city jail.

The scheme being that each department will have a check on the other in the matter of payment of fines, bonds, release of prisoners who have been fined and other features where money is involved.

Lee Grier was seen yesterday afternoon and questioned regarding the errors found in his accounts.

"I did pay \$24 into the treasury Friday afternoon when it was shown to me that my accounts were out that sum," said Mr. Grier. "If an explanation of the alleged errors I would say that it is possible persons have called on me at my afternoon place of business and paid me the money, which I forgot to charge up on my books. There was no real shortage in my accounts, but only clerical errors. Some of those fellows are trying to get me out of my job."

Regarding the possibility of his accounts being checked back for six years Mr. Grier said he had no misgivings on that score.

Crawford with the Muck Rake. Police Judge Crawford, who has been using the muck rake in the police court accounting department, said yesterday afternoon that he felt confident soon after he assumed his duties as police judge yesterday that there was great need of improvement in the accounting methods in vogue in the police court clerk's office.

"But," said the judge yesterday afternoon, "I was getting on to the ropes myself for awhile and thought that inasmuch as the city comptroller has been checking the clerk, each month the matter might not be so simple as it appeared."

Manager Simpson, as soon as he was aware that all the customers were being turned back at the entrances, hastened to the building commissioner, who informed him that he "ought to be in jail."

"I have repeatedly called attention to this matter, and if you are not man enough to protect the lives of your patrons you ought to be in jail," said the commissioner.

Mr. Simpson then called attention to the fact that the building commissioner had been too drastic and he should have proceeded against the manager of the store through the courts.

The store was allowed to open and Commissioner Barzen declared he would take out warrants for his managers.

Commissioner Barzen swore out a warrant for the arrest of James Simpson, manager of the Field retail store, charging six violations of the building law.

After accepting service of the warrant to give bond, Simpson appeared in court.

Mr. Simpson's court and gave bonds amounting to \$200 for his appearance in court to defend himself against the charges made by the building commissioner.

The case was set for hearing July 17.

BREWERS AGREE TO BE GOOD

Kansas City Companies Will Give Bond to Obey Kansas Law if Property is Released.

KANSAS CITY, July 9.—The brewers who control the joints in Kansas City, Kan., admitted defeat in their effort to keep their places open in defiance of the law when they announced tonight that they will agree never to sell liquor to the joints in Kansas City, Kan., again and promised to give bond to the city.

The Helm, Rochester and Imperial Brewing companies, which own and control 150 joints in Kansas City, Kan., will make application this week in the court of common pleas for the release of their property, which by order of court is locked up and held by the city.

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
