Note to Marshal Warner Tells of Body Dug from Soil by Dogs.

United States Marshal Warner is in recelpt of a letter from Dickens, Lincoln cunty, which has some elements of tragic nterest in it and may develop into a possible murder. The letter tells the story

thus:

DICKENS, Neb., July 1, 1905.—United States Marshal, Dear Sir: Mr. Joseph Doyle of Wallace purchased a place, or farm, from Harry Russell, six miles from Dickens, over a year ago. Mr. Doyle's sons and myself stayed there at intervals for the last year. About a week ago we hauled a wagon and let it stand outside the front door. The weather being hot, the dogs lying under the wagon got scent of a body of some kind that was buried there. The dogs dog down and found a body; we don't know what yet, as we have not been able to tell. We gathered some bones that came out of the hole. The body is hadly decomposed. The case looks suspicious. The place was a cattle ranch and it was not customary to bury dead animals. The place was strewn with dead cattle when we came there. Chief Executive Asks that Inquiry Into Records of Police Court Clerk for Entire Term Be Made.

In connection with the investigation being made into the records of former Police Court Clerk Lee Grier, Mayor Dahlman said Tuesan accountant to examine Grier's records Dickens is a small cattle town located for the entire term of his office as clerk of the police court, which, I understand, was six and a half years. With a record of fines paid to the clerk during sessions of police court already on the docket and the mittimus information added by the comptroller's clerks, the next step will be to check back on the docket the triplicate fine receipts held by the comptroller. The work is some time for the two clerks to check it

Take Judge and Clerk's O. Ks. In regard to previous checks made by the oity comptroller at the police court clerk's office, Mr. Lobeck explained Tuesday morning that his office relied on the daily "O. K." of the police judge on the clerk's docket, the custom not being to go back of the judge's approval in the auditing check. An examination of the cierk's records since January, when Judge Crawford came into office, shows that Judge Crawford did not "O. K." and sign the docket, for the reason, as he explained that he wanted to make sure the system in vogue was reliable before attaching his signature to the records. The refusal of Judge Crawford to affix his signature to

office and later caused the judge to make an investigation on his own account. Realizing that his O. K. to the clerk's records means something, Judge Crawford began to stir things up, the result being that he and the comptroller's office have devised a system which will show a complete record of every person arraigned in the police court. To determine whether prisoners shown on the records to have been committed to the county jail were actually sent there, the police judge will hereafter receive each day a report from the county jail showing an abstract of all prisoners received from the city jail. These reorts may be checked back to the clerk's docket at the police court by the police
