To the People from Their Popular Representatives.—Citizens of Russia, Parliament has been dissolved by order of July 21. You elected us as your representatives and instructed us to demand for you liberty and freedom.

REPRESION CAUSES UNANIMITY

Until the last moment it seemed that the desire for unanimous adoption of the manifesto would be wrecked. There were sharp differences between the constitutional democrats and the revolutionists, the latter wishing to proclaim the house in perpetual session and abrogate the allegiance of the people, while the constitutional democrats favored the declaration of a pacific general strike without resort to revolutionary measures.

EFFECT ON MARKETS

PARIS, July 23.—The tone of the Bourse today was very agitated, Russians falling heavily, bonds losing 19 francs and imperial 48 falling to 260, causing a general reaction.

JEWIS ARE THREATENED
