

DES MOINES EATS UP OMAHA

Champions Devour Three of Pa's Superb Pitchers, Winning 15 to 1.

MAKE TOTAL OF TWENTY BASE HITS

Cornes, Nilsson and Morrison Sgar Around While Bourkeites Manage to Make Four Skinny Hits.

Three of the men who draw pay from Pa as pitchers went up in hallooos at Vinton street park Tuesday afternoon, and as they did not carry sinkers they are probably better yet, for the Des Moines team, in its entirety and collectively, had on its batting clothes and hit the ball when and where it pleased, making twenty safe hits and fifteen runs, while Omaha was getting four measly little hits for a total of one run.

Although the game was a long one, it started right from the jump when Caution refused to tell Slats Davis who his battery was to be. Slats announced the Omaha battery and said he would tell Des Moines later.

The game started with Cornes in the box for Omaha and he lasted long enough to get one man out and that one, Weflay, sacrificed himself. Four runs and four hits were made off the southpaw from Boone before Hertran Long called upon Nilsson, who had been warming up. Nilsson is the University of Nebraska pitcher, who has beaten the Omaha dorks in the Union Field shops. He pitched for the shops team this spring when the Bourkeites were beaten by that organization.

Nilsson responded to the call and went to the pitcher's box, but Slats Davis refused to let him work, so he had on the red and white stockings of the University of Nebraska team and Slats ruled he was not in an Omaha uniform. Bill Morrison then had to go in without an opportunity of warming up, but he retired the side without further damage. Address hit to Morrison and Mazon struck out.

Slats Gets the Fine First.

A little incident occurred when Mazon came to bat. Davis refused to let him play until he had paid the fine assessed the day before when he was put out of the grounds. Mazon walked and Mazon struck out, and when it was hit to Davis the game went on.

Nine men faced the two pitchers in that lucky seventh and ten men faced Nilsson in the eighth. Five hits, an error and a base on balls netted six runs in the eighth. While but four hits were made off Mankie, all the way through he was wild, and Omaha's lone run was made in the second inning without a hit, and in the second and third both the bases were filled and a good hit would have tied the score and might have changed the result.

Welch made one of his phenom runs for Hoggie's short hit in the fifth. One of Bassey's errors was a bad throw, and he let the ball scoot by him for the other. Two of Runkle's three errors were made by standing a dummy and not touching the bag after the ball had been thrown straight at him.
