LIBERALS LOSE ZEMSTVOV

Reactionary Feeling is Shown in Elections Where Landlords Vote.

LANDED INTERESTS DRAWING TOGETHER

Year of Forced Expropriation of Land Causes Change in Sentiment on Part of Many Russians.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 12.—The government attaches much importance to the defeat of the constitutional democrats in the zemstvo elections now under way. For years the provincial zemstvos have been the centers of the liberal movement and practically all the constitutional democratic leaders have been prominent in zemstvo work. Now, as candidates for reelection, they are going down to defeat. M. Kakhoshka, next to M. Rodicheff, the most brilliant of the constitutional democratic orators in the outlawed Parliament, has been defeated by Count Sheremeteff, the notorious reactionary, and yesterday two constitutional democrats were defeated at Samara.

Landlords are Urging.

Nevertheless the important landed interests, reactionary or liberal, are uniting and lining up in favor of the government against the Parliament's radical agrarian program. There are strong reasons to believe that it is the intention of the Stolypin ministry, if things move normally, to support the candidate of the regenerationists, who are expected to amalgamate with the Octoberists, whether the co-operation of the right wing of the constitutional democrats is secured or not. A significant symptom of the radical change in the situation produced by the miserable failure of the general strike is the fact that the majority of the social democratic leaders who, a fortnight ago, were the most active promoters, are now in favor of turning their attention to the coming elections. They have already begun to canvass the situation for their candidates.

ALABAMA BANKER IS SHORT

Paying Teller of Birmingham Institution Sinks \$50,000 in Cotton Futures.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Aug. 12.—Within twelve hours today Alexander R. Chisolm, paying teller of the First National bank, was arrested, charged with the embezzlement of \$70,000 of the bank's funds, given a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner R. B. Wilson, put under bond of \$50,000, and falling to make it, he is in the custody of the United States officials at one of the principal hotels of the city. During the afternoon W. L. Sims and C. M. Hays, manager and assistant manager of a stock and option brokerage house, were arrested, charged with aiding and abetting the embezzlement of national bank funds. SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Aug. 12.—The selection of a jury was begun today at the trial of Doss Galbraith, one of the alleged leaders of the mob which hanged three negroes here last April. The court room was crowded, but order was strictly maintained by numerous deputy sheriffs. Since recent rumors of threats having been made against the police and officials of the trial were found to have been groundless excitement has quieted down.

KANSAS DEFENDS TRICKETT

Man Who Closes Kansas City Saloons Will Be Supported by State.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 12.—The saloon raid at Kansas City, Kan., waged so persistently a month ago by C. W. Trickett, the assistant attorney general appointed by Governor Hoch to enforce the prohibitory law, were resumed yesterday, when that official made the rounds of the joints in an automobile and arrested the proprietors of three places where liquor was being sold. Attorney Trickett is in receipt of the following message from Attorney General Coleman at Topeka, which refers to several damage suits recently brought by saloon keepers whose property had been destroyed by Trickett's order: "Pay no attention damage suits; all the power and resources of the state are directed against you, and vindicate the supremacy of the law."

GOVERNMENT MAY DO WORK

Geological Survey is Taking Steps to Build Irrigation Works in Wyoming.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—As soon as the inventories have been taken by the contractors' outfits set by the geological survey at Corbett tunnel and Shoshone dam, on irrigation projects of northern Wyoming, consideration will be given to plans of completing these great contracts. The failure of Charles Spear at Corbett tunnel and Prentiss & Clarkson at Shoshone dam to live up to the terms of their contracts is being investigated and may have some bearing on the method of completing the works. It is likely the geological survey will continue the work with the equipment and supplies set aside rather than let a new contract. More than \$1,000,000 is involved.

KAWVILLE'S PLAN TO GROW

Kansas City Will Grant No Saloon License Until Population is Four Hundred Thousand.

"Kansas City has a peculiar method to increase its population," said County Attorney Slabaugh Monday. He has just returned from a brief visit to the Missouri city. "The city council has passed an ordinance providing that the number of saloons shall not be increased until the population has reached 400,000. After that an additional license may be granted for each increase of 1,000 in the population. This has the appearance of throwing out an inducement to the people to get out and work, but in fact it is a device to increase the number of inhabitants."

BITULITHIC PLANT STAYS

Nebraska Company Engaged in Moving Its Machinery Out of Omaha.

Judge Troup Monday morning granted a temporary injunction to prevent the Nebraska Bitulithic company from moving any of the machinery of its asphalt plant from the city of Omaha. Hugh Murphy, who asked for the injunction, complained that he had a contract with the company under the terms of which it was to mix the asphalt required to fulfill his contracts with the city of Omaha. He asserted he would be greatly damaged if the plant were removed, as there is no other in the city he could utilize. The company was ordered to permit Murphy to use the plant during the remainder of the asphalt season.

BIG DAY FOR NEBRASKA FIRST

MRS. DISS DEBAR RELEASED

Notorious Adventurer Finishes Her Term in a London Prison.

CRIMES COMMITTED THREE CONTINENTS

Large Sums of Money Extorted from Credulous Men by Means of Pretended Occult Powers.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—Ann O'Delia Diss Debar who under the name of Laura Jackson was sentenced on December 30, 1901, to seven years penal servitude for connection with an immoral cult, known as "Theosophical Society," of which her husband, Theodore Jackson, was the head, has been liberated from Aylesbury prison under ticket of leave, having obtained the maximum reduction of sentence by good behavior.

Mrs. Diss Debar has been known under many names in the United States and Great Britain, but her greatest notoriety was achieved last year in London, when she was called spiritualistic deception by which she deceived the public by means of a so-called "Theosophical Society." She was in fact the daughter of Prof. John C. Salomon, one of the founders of the "Theosophical Society" in New York, who was in his old age, stripped of his fortune, and accumulated in the practice of law.
