

PEONAGE SYSTEM ATTACKED

Government to Send Greek and Syrian Lads to School

or Home.

Numbers of Greek and Syrian boys who have been brought to Omaha to black shoes and sell papers by employers, resembling the Italian padrone, are to receive attention from the immigration

bureau authorities. The Greeks and Byrians work for about #12 per month and are required to turn all their savings and earnings over to their employers, who have been the means of bringing them to this country.

An effort will be made to have such of these youngsters as are of school age sent to school, and in the event of the refusal of their contract guardians to permit them to attend school under the compulsory education laws, the alien immigration and contract labor laws will be invoked against them. An investigation was made into some of these cases several months ago, but the Greeks to a boy insisted they had been sent to this country by their parents, who were well-to-do farmers in Greece, and that they sent their earnings above their expenses back home. It was learned, however, that the boys were required to turn their wages over to their contract employers and were given barely enough to buy clothes and food, and that these requisites were furnished them by their employers, and that in fact they rarely saw any ready cash.


