DODGE GIVES HIS PLATFORM

Creates Innovation in Filing So that Voters May Know Where He Stands.

Representative N. P. Dodge, Jr., in filing for rengmination by the republicans for another term in the legislature, has created an innovation. He has prepared and given out the personal platform on which he stands, believing that candidates should take such a course in the absence of a convention or opportunity to express what he stands for in a concrete way before the primaries. Immediately after filing Mr.

Dodge gave out this statement:

As the enactment of the direct primary law for Douglas county does away with party conventions, and hence the adoption of the party platforms. I feel it is incumbent upon a candidate for office to give to the people some platform or principles which he pledges himself to uphold and insofar as he is able to carry out if nonginated and elected. I therefore wish to state to the republicans of Douglas county that in filing as a candidate for the legislature I pledge myself to support, with all my ability, the enactment of the following measures, which seem to me at this time the most important subjects for legislatures in Nebraska:

First—The enactment of a state-wide Dodge gave out this statement:

measures, which seem to me at this time the most important subjects for legislatures in Nebraska:

First—The enactment of a state-wide direct primary law, which will permit the people to nominate all city, county, state and congressional candidates, and to declare their preference for United States senator, without the aid of a convention.

Second—Although I do not believe the endorsement of a United States senator by the state convention is as desirable as nomination by direct primary. I still believe it is a step in the right direction, therefore, if elected, I will vote for the candidate who is nominated by the state convention, whoever he may be, as such endorsement will be the best evidence of the people's choice.

Third—I believe we should have a constitutional convention or some concerted action by the legislature to pass several important amendments to the present constitution, which is antiquated, inadequate and unworthy our great state.

Fourth—We should create a rallroad commission by constitutional amendment and in the enactment measure grant the commission similar powers over state traffic that the federal commission has over interstate carriers. The present conditions. A railroad commission elected by the people, with jurisdiction over all common carriers within the state and with power to fix reasonable rates would be more effective and fairer to the people and the carriers than a maximum rate bill drawn by a legislature. Legislators who meet once in two years and who have no training or time to study the details are, in my opinion, more apt to pass an unconstitutional law than an effective one in this re-

Fifth—The present tax law should be preserved in the main, but should be so changed as to equalize the burden of taxation between the individual and the corporation. In Douglas county the individual is sustaining the burden and the railroad is escaping taxation by spreading its terminal values over its entire mileage in the state.

is escaping taxation by spreading its terminal values over its entire mileage in the state.

The tax on mortgages should be repealed, for it results in double taxation and puts a premium on foreign held mortgages. They pay no taxes, while the citizens of Nebraska who loan money to the local home builder must pay a tax on his mortgage. Today the savings of Nebraska are not going into real estate mortgages, for the lender must charge 7 or 8 per cent to net him 5 or 6 per cent. This is unfair to our own people and detrimental to local improvement of the land.

Sixth—I have mentioned only a few of the important subjects for legislation, but I may confidently refer the people of Douglas county to my record in the last session and assure them that in all matter of legislation. I will use my best efforts for progressive legislation along all lines tending to the betterment of our laws and their administration.
