Compels Council to Knock Off Hundred and Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars.

TOTAL RATE WILL BE FIFTY-SIX MILLS

Decrease Partially Due to Increased Assessed Valuation, Last Levy Being Sixty-Four and Eight Tenths.

Forced by Mayor Dahlman, the council agreed yesterday to a \$125,000 cut in the proposed \$1,000,000 tax levy for city purposes in 1907. The mayor met the council in informal and special sessions and told it he had done some studying and concluded that \$75,000 could be lopped from the sinking fund and \$6,000 from the general fund. He read a veto of the \$1,000,000 tax levy, giving his reasons in the belief that \$125,000 could be out off without much difficulty and pointing out that the council had no alternative but grant the school board levy of 16 mills instead of cutting it down

Councilmen at once undertook to show his honor that the sinking fund might be reduced, but nothing could be saved on municipal expenditures otherwise because the city is growing rapidly and needing more money every year. The executive, however, said that five months remained for the council to figure out a way of economizing and rejecting superfluittes and he was convinced that if only a limited sum of money was available ways of retrenchment would be found. The sinking fund, he pointed out, is now the receptacle of back taxes and scavenger law revenues, and it is not necessary to redeem bonds falling due, but make renewal issues.

Ninety-Four Per Cent in Hand. The mayor said that while 90 per cent of the amount levied is available only unless a higher percentage is collected, that in 1904 64 per cent of the current year's taxes had been received and in 1905 93 per cent. With the cleaning up of back taxes by the scavenger law, he was of the opinion that the collections in 1907 would reach % per cent, which would yield \$37,000 over the usual 90 per cent limit.

To the importunings of councilmen, his honor turned a deaf ear and declared quietly that he would veto a resolution omitting the decreases he propesed. As the county commissioners agreed to wait only until Wednesday morning before making the levy, time was not available for the council to receive a second veto and pass it over the mayor's head. They had to accept the first veto because of the error in the school tax levy. Councilman Bedford remarked that the legislative body was badly up against it and there was nothing left to do except to comply with the executive's wishes. Hence an agree-ment to comply. The resolution was adopted at a special meeting in the after-

The action means about a 56-mill levy for the city, against 64.8 mills in 1906, the decrease being partly accounted for by increased assessment valuation, figured on a one-fifth basis.
